The judges, consisting of Arthur Hewitt, president of the Ontario Fire Prevention League; J. B. Laddlaw, president of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, and W. H. Shapley, president of the Dominion Fire Prevention Association, have rendered their decision in the competition among the students of the various high schools throuth the province, who competed for the sterling silver medals offered by the Ontario Fire Prevention League.

The medals are most attractive from an artistic as well as from a patriotic standpoint, and show on the obverse the beaver between the Union Jack and the Canadian ensign surmounting a wreath of maple leaves. Under the provincial coat of arms are the words "It is a patriotic duty to prevent fire."
