While a falling off in some lives of trade and industry has occurred, the year, as a whole, has been a prosperous one for Canada. Stock-taking has shown that where the year's volume of trade has been smaller, there has been an increase in the value of loods traded in, and the net returns have been as great, if not greater. Last year's prosperity enabled the consuming public to

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


