## Forestry Men To Go To Montreal

Overseas Soon—Promise of Recruits at Dipper Harbor—News of the Soldiers

The local detachment of the 242nd Forestry Battalion will leave on Monday evening for Montreal. It is reported that the unit will go overseas very shortly as it is now over strength. The recruiting for this battalion has ceased and Lieut. Blair, who has been in charge of the recruiting here, will leave shortly to rejoin his battalion.

It is reported that Captain A. D. Correll, who last year was commandant of the branch of the R. S. I. being here will in all probability be a member of the staff of the N. B. command this coming winter.

Recruiting  
William A. McManus of Hampton signed on yesterday for overseas service with the 242nd Forestry battalion and Harry Macaulay of St. John with the Field Ambulance.

A big recruiting meeting was held at Dipper Harbor last night and, although no recruits were actually secured, the names of twenty-eight young men were taken and it is expected that after the fishing season is over some of them will join the unit.

Four Wounded  
The midnight casualty list contains the names of four more N. B. men among the wounded. They are: Jule Mally, Newcastle; Oscar White, Fredericton; Dorlan Pond, Fredericton, and Albert Lecuir, Balmora.

Mrs. J. A. Morison, wife of Rev. Dr. Morison, received word last night to the effect that her nephew, Boyd Nichol of Fort William, Ontario, had been killed in action. He was nineteen years old and was a member of a Highland unit.

John G. Williams of the 140th battalion has been promoted to be sergeant major of the 242nd Forestry battalion. The Chaplains

Major the Rev. G. W. Wood, of New Brunswick, recently wounded by a bullet, has rejoined his unit in the first division, though at the time of his injury reports were current of his death. Captain the Rev. A. P. Shofield is leaving France this week and is sailing for

Montreal soon. Captain the Rev. A. L. Sherry, Nova Scotia, Captain the Rev. A. Ketterson, Belleville, and Captain the Rev. Canon Headley, Port Arthur, have proceeded to the front on chaplain duty. Major the Rev. J. Pringle and Major the Rev. C. C. Owen have taken up duty with the hospitals.

## OBJECT OF ROBBERS WAS GOLD BULLION

Hold-up Near Detroit Missed C. P. R. Train With a Fortune Aboard; Wrong Express Halted

London, Ont., Oct. 5.—The motive behind the hold-up and robbery of Michigan Central Express No. 14, from Chicago to New York, a few miles out of Detroit at midnight has become known to C. P. R. officials here. It has been found that the robbers actually intended to hold-up C. P. R. Express No. 20, which travels over the M. C. R. west of Detroit, and which should have preceded the Michigan Central train by a short margin. The C. P. R. Express, carrying a fortune in gold bullion, was a little late, however, and lost its customary position on the time card. Falling behind the M. C. R. Express it was that saved it from the robbers, who diligently ransacked the express and baggage cars of the train attacked, seemingly with a fixed purpose. It is believed here that they learned of the coming bullion shipment, and sought to intercept it. The gold, however, was quite intact, though closely guarded when it passed through London for Toronto and the east.

## BRITISH EXPENSES RISE FIVE BILLIONS IN YEAR

London, Oct. 5.—Interesting figures are contained in a treasury statement, covering the six months of the fiscal year ended September 30.

The exchequer balance sheet of that period shows:—Total receipts, £1,698,087,085 (\$9,843,435,425) total issues out of the exchequer, \$9,710,194,015, an increase of nearly \$5,000,000,000 over the corresponding six months of last year.

Of the receipts only \$819,614,495 came from revenue, \$5,215,000,000 being money raised by the creation of a debt and nearly \$2,160,000,000 on credit of ways and means.

Revenue receipts show increases of \$305,000,000 over the same period last year, nearly \$95,000,000 of this being from property and income tax, and more than \$155,000,000 from duties on excess profits. The postal service showed an increase of \$10,444,000 and the customs an increase of \$35,000,000.

## MORE BREAD FOR GERMANY

Larger Crops Insure the Maintenance of Increased Rations

Berlin, Sept. 29, (by wireless to Surville).—The larger harvest of this year has enabled the authorities not only to maintain the increased bread rations granted several months ago, for persons who have hard manual labor to perform and to provide an additional fifty grammes of flour a day for young people between 12 and 17 years old, as recently announced, but has made it possible to insure the increased rations being maintained during the entire year to come. The authorities declare that these

increases are based on conservative reports regarding the size of this year's crops.

The price of rye flour has been reduced one mark for 100 kilograms, the announcement adds, and it is expected that rye, oats and other cereal products, for soup making, will be produced on a larger scale within a short time, constituting a considerable improvement in the provisioning situation. Important increases in the fodder crops are pointed to, it being noted that the yields of oats and barley are far superior to those of last year.
