NOVA SCOTIAN WAS TURKISH ADMIRAL

A former Nova Scotian is dead in Turkey, where he arose to great power. He was known in his native town of Eatonville, N. S., as Rans Bucknam, but left that place early in life going to the Great Lakes, where he followed navigation. Later he went to sea with different companies, until finally he found himself in Turkey, where he had gone from the states with an armed cruiser built by the emperor of Philadelphia for the Sultan. The latter took a liking to him, and made him Admiral of the Turkish fleet, the salary \$10,000 a year. He became known as Bucknam Pasha.

MORE ABOUT NEW BRUNSWICKERS WOUNDED

Driver Abernethy, of Chipman, who is with the Divisional Ammunition Column of the First Canadian Contingent now in Flanders, tells of receiving a badly bruised leg when his horse became frightened and reared, throwing him to the ground.

Pte. Arden Hallett, son of Josiah Hallett, lumberman of Millville, is one of several former members of the 12th Battalion reported wounded. Young Hallett was formerly in the employ of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Fredericton.

F. P. Hunter, of St. Stephen, traveling representative of the Dominion Fertilizer Company, received word that his son, Rufus Hunter, of the 14th Battalion had been wounded. Young Hunter enlisted at St. Stephen with the first draft from the 1st Regiment.

Another former member of the 12th Battalion who had been wounded is Pte. Chesley Gray of Mill Bank, Northumberland County.

Miss Alice Robinson, who is attending the Normal School, has received a letter from her cousin, Private N. J. Robinson, now with the 12th Battalion in France. He is a son of George Robinson, formerly of Scott Mills, York County, and enlisted at Medicine Hat. He was an engineer with the C. P. R. At Tyres a bullet went through his hat. His wrist was grazed with a bullet and he had a skin deep shrapnel wound, but it was not worth mentioning and a bullet went through the butt of his rifle.

Husband's Evidence and Her Own Confession Ruled Out—Advice of Attorney-General Will Be Sought

Hopewell Cape, N. B., May 31.—The case against Mrs. Alice M. Johnson, aged twenty-three years, charged with being an active participant in the conspiracy to poison her husband, Carl Johnson, has been seriously blocked. The case opened today before Judge Crockett, D. Mullin, K. C., prosecuting and C. Lionel Hanington of Dorchester and George H. Steadman, Hopewell Cape, for the defence.

The evidence of the woman's husband was not allowed on objection of counsel for the defence. Objection was also taken to the introduction of the statement made by Mrs. Johnson to Magistrate Peck on the grounds that she had understood that it was not to be used against her.

His Honor said at this stage that the crown should consider whether the case should be proceeded with and Mr. Mullin said that he would consult with the attorney-general.

Some other evidence, of little importance, was taken and the case will proceed on Tuesday morning.
