

# NEWCASTLE DISREGARDS ORDERS TO MEET CAMPBELLTON OUTFIT

## OVER WINNERS ON NORTH SHORE NOT QUALIFIED

### Watermen Meet Moncton in Second Game on Saturday

ANOTHER tangle has developed in the New Brunswick amateur baseball situation through the refusal of Newcastle, winners of the series with Fredericton, to meet Campbellton in a series to decide the semi-finals. Newcastle say that Campbellton is not eligible.

In the meantime, the Watermen play Moncton on Saturday afternoon at Moncton. A win for them would clinch the series, but a loss would necessitate a third game. Whether it would be played right after Saturday's game or set over a week has not been definitely settled.

The Newcastle press, referring to the decision of the Newcastle team not to play Campbellton, has the following: "Monday afternoon Capt. A. L. Barry, manager of the Newcastle baseball team, received a telephone message from W. E. Irving, Saint John, vice-president of the N. B. A. U. of C., advising him to arrange a play-off series with Campbellton, the winners of such series to play the finals with the winners of the Moncton C. N. R. and Saint John Water Department series, which are now being played.

"Manager Barry immediately called the executive of the N. B. A. U. together to ascertain their wishes in the matter. The executive met and after discussion and consideration, it was decided to advise Mr. Barry that the association did not recognize that its team had any right to play Campbellton, because of that team's ineligibility. "Mr. Barry of the Campbellton team was called on the phone by Mr. Barry and he stated that their team was not a member of any league, but that Campbellton and Dalhousie had played home and home games only. The executive of the N. B. A. U. considered that this did not constitute a series such as would make Campbellton eligible to participate in a semi-final provincial play-off and instructed Manager Barry to advise Mr. Barry of the Association's attitude in the matter."

## DISTRIBUTION OF SEATS QUESTIONED

### Postoffice Officials to Inquire Into Manner of Allotting Tickets For World Series

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 16.—The Federal Government has begun another "in" in the National League pennant race. The St. Louis post office asked the plan announced for the sale of world's series tickets here did not constitute a violation of regulations forbidding operation of a lottery through the mails.

Postmaster Alt said he was "quite sure" that determination of who gets tickets and location of seats by any drawing would constitute a violation. He requested a definite ruling from Washington, however.

Sam Braden, Cardinal president, said he would modify the plan to conform to any suggestion of the Post Office Department.

Meanwhile, six clerks began the task of opening seven sacks of mail, estimated to contain 17,500 letters with more than enough applications to exhaust the 23,238 reserved seats and indefinite number of box seats.

## YANKS GAIN ON NEAREST RIVALS

### Cincinnati Retains Lead at Top Over Cardinals, Again Beating Brooklyn

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—The National League pennant scramble continued at a feverish pace with Cincinnati maintaining a half game edge on first place over the Cardinals. Bill McKechnie's champion Pirates faltered in their attempt to overhaul the leaders and were set back to three and a half games from the crest by giving away to the Giants.

The American circuit spectacle found the Yanks tightening their grip on the top rung by a full game by virtue of a triumph in the opening battle of a six game series at Cleveland.

New York now leads by six and one half games, and can sew up the championship by taking four of five contests left to play with the Indians. Possibility of the outcome of the National remaining in doubt up to the final game of 1926 championship became more plausible today as the Reds and Cardinals refuse to slacken their terrific gait.

Loose playing by the Robins was a great aid to the Reds yesterday, and behind the steady pitching of Eppa Rixey they chalked up their fifth straight victory in the series against Brooklyn by 7 to 2. Five misplays were counted against the Flatbush Rock. Jack Hendricks' outfit has won 18 of 22 games with Brooklyn this year.

Four-run rallies in the fourth and eighth innings enabled the Cards to dispose of the Phillies easily by 9 to 2 in the first combat of a series. Jess Haines was banged for 11 safeties, but he tightened up at crucial periods to prevent a score. The ex-Giant, "Billy" Southworth, injected three hits for the Cards in five times up.

Jack Scott tacked a 6 to 5 defeat on the Corsairs in their farewell meeting at the Polo grounds.

Running true to form as trouble makers, the Braves all but knocked the Cubs out of the mathematical figuring as far as pennant hopes were concerned, by annexing both parts of a twin card by 1 to 0, and 3 to 1. Genewick stopped the Cubs with four hits in the sixth while Edwards worked in six safeties in the closing frames.
