

# ANS ARE ANXIOUS TO SEE GORMAN SKATE HERE AGAINST STAP

## LOCAL SKATER MAKES SWEEP AT NEWBURGH

Interest Here in Ice Skating Game Being Allowed to Die Out

THIS reports that had been in circulation here that Charlie Gorman was going better than ever have been borne out in the results of the New Year's Day meet at Newburgh, N. Y., which was won in easy fashion by Gorman from a field of fast skaters. Charlie scored more than double the number of points of his nearest competitor.

The result of the Newburgh races was awaited with much interest by the Saint John fans and much enthusiasm has been shown regarding Gorman's win. As a result, Saint John people are anxious to see Charlie in action in his home town and it is hoped that arrangements will be made for a series of races here at which the outstanding stars of Canada and the United States would participate.

The fact that there have been no steps taken for the holding of races here for Juniors and Intermediates is taken as an unhealthy sign for the future of the sport in Saint John. Last season a world championship meet was staged here, but this season it seems as though the sport was going to be allowed to sink back into obscurity. If such should be the case, the fame of Saint John, gained by Gorman and others, would soon wane and the name of the city soon faded from the map of the world. A meet should be held here.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Jan. 2.—Charles I. Gorman, of Saint John, N. B., world speed skating champion, won Saturday night the Middle-Atlantic speed skating championship for the second successive year. Gorman scored 110 points out of a possible 120. His nearest rival was Paul Forstman, New York, who scored 50 points.

Miss Lella Brooks, of the Old Orchard Club, Toronto, defeated Snodgrass Third.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Jan. 1.—Charles I. Gorman, of Saint John, N. B., was outstanding in the Middle Atlantic speed skating championships held today.

Only once was he beaten in five final events, having scored 110 points of a possible 120 in the championship program. He went on to win the 3-mile race which is a memorial to Joseph Donohue of Newburgh, a world's champion skater in his history. Heartily he asked that credit be given his young fellow townsman, Edgar Snodgrass, who had placed third in the 3-mile event in which a field of 50 had participated.

Gorman not only captured the championship, but won the 3-mile Joseph Donohue Memorial race. Pacing the first laps of this event with the field of 50 entrants, Gorman came up fast near the finish to win over Irving W. Jaffee of New York and Edgar Snodgrass of Saint John.

ICE STAYS HARD.

Despite the fact that the temperature remained above freezing during the day, the ice of Downing Park Lake remained hard as the sun hid behind clouds. A throng estimated to number more than 10,000 witnessed the events.

IT WAS CANADA'S DAY.

Gorman was in wonderful form. The Canadian showed the way in four successive finals, outskating his opponents with ease and demonstrating his superiority on the steel blades to the greatest satisfaction of the crowd.

220 WIN GAINED AT START.

Forstman's victory in the 220 was gained at the start of the race before the long sweeping stride of the Saint John man fell into the rhythm of victory. Thereafter Gorman was never threatened by Forstman, and his beautiful skating called forth round after round of applause from the gallery.

## RISBERG PROBE ON WEDNESDAY

More Than 30 Players Hailed Before Landis—Collins, Schalk and Others

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—The baseball court of Commissioner Kenesaw E. Landis, former Federal judge, is planning a hearing of some of the speed skating players in the game set for next Wednesday. Invitations were sent today to Ed Collins, Ray Schalk, Red Pater, Donnie Bush, Clarence Rowland, and about 30 others, who were named in an affidavit given the commissioner on Saturday night by Charles A. "Swede" Risberg. He told Landis that the Chicago White Sox, with whom he used to play, plotted a four-game series September 2 and 3, 1917, so that Detroit would lay down in four games and give the Sox a better chance for the pennant. Landis then set Wednesday as the date for further investigation.

Some of these Risberg named as contributing \$45 each toward a present of about \$1,000 for the Detroit players. Risberg, who is now in the employ of early New York and New England, dodging the law to see and blue coats of the law to see the light.

Everybody knew, said Nemo Liebold, Sox outfielder at the time, that the Chicago team gave Detroit that money for beating Boston in three games, September 19 and 20, killing the Red Sox chances of winning the pennant from the White Sox. The Detroit pitchers were not hit by down for the Sox, he said.

Frank Navin, president of the Detroit Club, believes money that he was sent to Detroit pitchers by the White Sox for their work in defeating the Boston Red Sox in a series of four games, was not his money, but was the money of the 1917 season, which virtually eliminated Boston from the race.

According to Navin, it was common during 1916 when Detroit was in the race for the pennant, for officials of the Boston club to induce pitchers to play "to beat down" on Detroit. The White Sox, who were in the same position 1917, that the Tigers were in 1916, felt privileged to similarly award the pitchers who helped them by beating the Red Sox.

## TEX MAY OFFER GENE \$750,000 FOR NEXT BOUT

Promoters Go West to Interview Champion—Announcement Expected

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Tex Rickard packed his grips for St. Louis today assuring friends he would return with the contract of Gene Tunney for a world heavyweight championship battle next September at Yankee Stadium.

Rickard departs for the west tomorrow, and Humbert J. Fugazy, who has entered into a race with the Madison Square Garden promoter for Tunney's signature, is expected to hit the same trail a day later. Since the champion has made it clear he seeks to settle the promoting duel as soon as possible, observers here look for definite action before the end of the week.

Tunney already admits that Fugazy has made him a "very generous offer," while Rickard admits his purse "will be plenty." Boxing men close to Tex say he may go as high as \$750,000, the cheque he drew in favor of Jack Dempsey for the Sequi-centennial battle.

## Lewis-Munn Meet Tonight For World Title

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—Ed (Strangler) Lewis has put up his \$10,000 diamond belt, emblematic of the heavyweight wrestling championship for the victor in his match tonight with Wayne (Big) Munn.

Nearly two years ago Munn tossed Lewis out of the ring, in Kansas City, and claimed the title, when Lewis was unable to appear for his left arm last fall, forcing postponement of a match at Los Angeles with Joe Stecher, claimant of the title, and this will be the first severe test Lewis has given his arm since the accident.
