QUEBEC VOTE FIGURES

Mr. Doucet did not believe that the result of the last election indicated a want of faith by Quebec in the tariff policy of Conservative party. Other considerations had been exaggerated until they obscured the tariff issue, and he believed that if the average elector of Quebec could be sounded out on the tariff question, it would be found that he was in favor of Mr. Meighen's tariff policy. In any case, an analysis of the popular vote in Quebec last October revealed that the Liberal party had lost in comparison with 1921 about 87,000 votes, while the Conservatives had gained more than 100,000.

Mr. Doucet had not finished when the House adjourned at the close of the day.


For Coal Invented Schooner And 500
