EQUALS WORLD'S RECORD.
North Randall, Cleveland, O., Aug. 15.—Tilly Brooke, six-year-old mare by Tilly Brooke, the St. James, driven by Thomas Murphy, virtually equalled the world's trotting race record attached to a sulky here today, when he negotiated the first heat of the 2005 class trotting in 2:02.5. The record is 2:01.4, or three-hundredths of a second faster, was established on this track by Hamburg Belle in 1909 and has been considered Tilly Brooke's time as equal.

By trotting the second heat in 2:02.5 Tilly Brooke trotted the two fastest heats of the year.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—(Associated Press)—By virtue of his achievements in the Olympic games Harold M. Osborne of the Illinois A.C. has won an enduring place among America's premier track and field athletes of all time. Osborne won two gold medals by his brilliant victories in the running high jump and decathlon at Paris, thereby reaching the zenith of a long and remarkable career.

The one man, aside from Osborne himself, to whom a lion's share of credit is due for the athlete's record is Coach Harry Gill, who has been training men at the University of Illinois for 20 years. Gill discovered and developed Osborne shortly after he arrived at the university, an obscure aspirant for honors in the world of sports.

Osborne, who possesses intercollegiate, National A.A.U. and Olympic trophies, won his first important title, the Western Conference high jump championship, only four years ago. He has suffered occasional reverses in this sense since then but has remained supreme in the decathlon, his specialty. He registered his most praiseworthy achievements in this event at the Columbus Stadium a few weeks ago, not only winning the Olympic title but establishing a new world mark.

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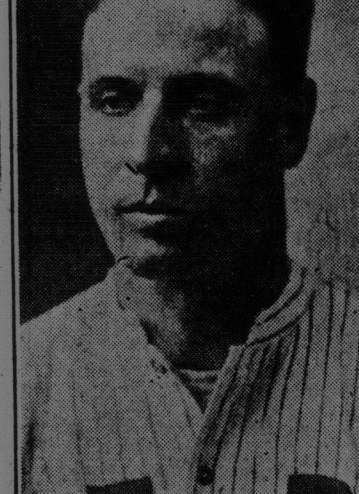
