MR. HAYES SAW CAST OF MEMORIAL

Sculptor's Work for Monument Promises to Prove His Best.

Unveiling of the city's soldier memorial monument, which is now in course of construction. is expected morning to undergo some repairs. to take place next spring with a distinguished personage as the chief speaker for the occasion. R. T. Hayes, M. L. A., chairman of the Citizens' Committee which has charge of the project, announced this today. The date has not been set and probably will not be for several months, but the chairman thought that it probably would be on a local holiday, such as Loyalist Day, of the King's birthday, or Dominion Day. He said he felt St. John citizens would be proud of the monument when it was erected and in view of its importance, he thought Lord Byng, the Governor-General, or Sir Arthur Currie, printo take place next spring with a dis-General, or Sir Arthur Currie, principal of McGill University and commander of the Canadian forces in the great war, or some other person prominent in Canadian affairs, would be invited to officiate.

Mr. Hayes said he was in Toronto recently and while there visited Alfred Howell, who has charge of the Alfred Howell, who has charge of the construction of the shaft. Mr. Hayes saw the plaster cast of the upper figure. The lower one still is in the foundry. The sculptor has done work of this kind for several Ontario cities which has given much satisfaction and many who have seen the St. John unit believed it would prove the best work of this kind he has done. The monument, as has already been announced, will be situated in the plot in King Square facing the Admiral Beatty Hotel.
