every year £180,000 as emperor and

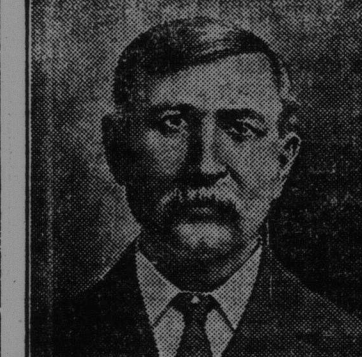
