**LOOKING INTO POWER PROSPECTS AT MISPEC DAM**

**City Engineer Asked To Look Up Earlier Reports Before Council Takes Further Action—No Decision on Harbor Front Railways—Pipe Tender Accepted**

The proposal to develop electric power at Mispec to aid in lighting the city, being discussed as the result of the increased rates which will be charged by the N. B. Power Co., received further attention at a meeting of the common council in committee this morning. The engineer was instructed to look up previous reports on the matter and the suggestion was made that a complete survey be authorized.

There was considerable discussion over a motion to spend about \$10,000 in repairs to the city wharves on the east side of the harbor to make them strong enough to carry the weight of the railway tracks. No action was taken.

The tender for two tons of cast iron pipe for the East St. John extension at \$91.50 was accepted. Authority was given for the laying of concrete floors in the stables of two of the fire stations.

Action against the owners of the building at the corner of Union and Mill streets, which has been in bad condition since it was burned nine months ago, was threatened at the meeting and the city solicitor will be consulted.

Mayor Hayes presided until he had to leave, when Commissioner Fisher took his place. All the members of the council were on hand.

Commissioner McLellan asked authority to expend \$640 in No. 1 H. W. E. fire station and \$410 in No. 7, W. E. for concrete floors in the stalls and the replacing of the stalls. The request was recommended to council. The work will be done by Stevens & Stevens who have the first contract.

**LOCAL NEWS**

**DUFFY O'GRADY.**  
Frederick Duffy and Teresa Margaret O'Grady were united in marriage in the Cathedral at 6 o'clock this morning by Rev. William Duke, who was celebrant at nuptial mass. The bride was attended by Miss Helen Ward and the groom by James Hoyt.

**ALONG THE RIVER.**  
Yesterday was like a reunion on a day along the river and there were probably more motor boat parties along shore from the Mills to Carr Point than on Sunday all summer. The Ocomee had a large passenger list on Saturday afternoon and many auto parties went out from the city yesterday. There is here and there a bit of autumn coloring in the woods, but the weather yesterday was that of summer.

**BLUEBERRY RAIDS.**  
For the last two or three weeks motoring parties and others have been making great raids upon the blueberry fields of Poodoogah and other nearby patches on the western shore roads. The yield of fruit has been enormous this season in spite of the fact that the prices in town have kept unusually high. Therefore, this enterprise on the part of car owners and householders in general has kept from cheating the store-keeper out of many a dollar he might otherwise have received.

**SAW MILL BURNED.**  
Taylor and White's saw mill at White Head was destroyed by fire on Saturday morning. The fire started about 9 o'clock while the men were at work and when the blaze was noticed it was working up about the boiler shop. All hands turned to fight the flames, but despite their efforts the mill was demolished. It was used for sawing staves, etc., in connection with the firm's cooperage business. It is said that there was no insurance on the building.

**HAS SISTER IN ST. JOHN.**  
William Avory of Chatham received the following from Ottawa recently: "Deeply regret to inform you that Private Frank Neil Avory (infantry) officially reported died of wounds at No. 7 Casualty Clearing Station on Aug. 27." The young man was twenty-three years old on May 24 last. Besides his parents there remain three brothers, George, William and James, all in the United States, and four sisters, Mrs. Harry Green, Mrs. Stanley Gouchy and Mrs. Joseph McCarthy, Chatham, and Mrs. Alexander Gouchy of St. John.

**ARTESIAN WELL BORING.**  
William Day, artesian well contractor, is completing a deep boring on the Millidgeville road near the head of the Yacht Club hill and on a property adjoining the subdivision known as North-bein Heights. The machine has already reached a depth of eighty feet, and it is expected water will soon be reached. The boring of an artesian well on this land will bring to the surface the first portable flow in that locality and with the expansion of St. John's residential facilities in the near future such work contains a special interest.

**FROM CALGARY ON VISIT.**  
Mrs. W. G. Dunlop, formerly of this city, but now of Calgary, Alta., is in the city visiting relatives. It has been four years since she has been here, and upon this occasion it was to return from the west where her husband who was fatally ill and who succumbed soon after his arrival. Mr. Dunlop will be remembered as the publisher and editor of the Golden Ball corner. Mrs. Dunlop is progressing favorably with her grown boys and girls in Calgary and feels that she decided wisely in having her children continue their business education on work in that growing part of Canada.

**EMPLOYES OF PULP MILL FORM UNION.**  
The employees of the Nashvale Pulp & Paper Co. held a meeting yesterday afternoon in Orange hall, Fairville, to discuss the advisability of organizing a union. One of the organizers from the United States explained the advantages of a union and what benefits had been derived from co-operation and united effort by employees elsewhere. The address was very attentively followed by the men. Labor representatives from St. John also spoke and the meeting finally decided in favor of forming a union. Election of president resulted in the choice of Fred Trotter and an executive committee was also appointed.

**3,700 MILE TRIP WITHOUT TROUBLE.**  
(St. Thomas Times-Journal, Aug. 31)  
Rev. F. P. Dennison, pastor of the Centre Street Baptist church, with his wife and daughter, Miss Elizabeth, returned after a pleasant motor trip to Mrs. Dennison's old home at Moncton, N. B. The trip, Mr. Dennison informed "The Times-Journal," was a most pleasant one, taking them through the States of New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Maine, all of which have splendid roads. The worst roads experienced were in Ontario, especially between Hamilton and Paris. The trip was made in Mr. Dennison's Ford, which covered the 3,700 miles, speedometer measurement, on 154 gallons of gasoline and without a puncture or blowout. The trip back, 1,845 miles, was made in eighty-one hours.

Mr. Dennison was greatly impressed with the earnestness with which the American people have gone into the war, and he is more than satisfied that with this spirit existing throughout the United States, the Allies will beat the Kaiser. One of the most impressive experiences of Mr. Dennison's trip was the views in the Tremont temple in Boston of the film production of Ambassador Gerard's book "My Four Years in Germany." This shows more than ever the cold-blooded way in which the Kaiser planned the war and the brutish way in which it has since been conducted.
