C. P. R. MATTER IN AUSTRIA GETS INTO PARLIAMENT; A BILL IS INTRODUCED

Vienna, Austria, Oct. 21.—The Austrian government today, as the result of recent developments in the emigration traffic from Austria to Canada and the United States, introduced into the lower house the Austrian parliament a bill prohibiting any emigration liable to have an adverse effect on military recruiting in Austria, or calculated to promote the white slave traffic.

Several interpellations on the subject of the operations of the C. P. R. agents in Austria and demanding full information as to the result of the government's investigation, and the names of the Austrian officials alleged to have been involved in the transactions, were laid on the table of the house.

IT IS A SPIRITED CONTEST IN COUNTY

Election to Municipal Council Gave Early Indication of a Large Vote

A stiff fight is being conducted by the candidates for office in the county, and, judging from the interest shown at the polls this morning, a record vote will be tallied. Friends of the candidates were out in force from early morning, and a brisk canvass was carried on throughout the districts, while voters who were located at a distance from the booths were hurried to the polls in motor cars and carriages. The large number of vehicles at the disposal of the workers proved that the fight has been a stiff one, and it is generally acknowledged that the candidates will offer a close contest in every district.

The polling for councillors in Simonds today is brisk and there seems to be a lot of interest in the election. Both sides are apparently well organized and the representatives of both the old council and the council in the making are at the polls. Up to the time of going to press it was impossible to judge with any degree of certainty which way the majority would go. The polls will close at four o'clock.

The candidates in the different parishes are as follows:

St. Martin's—C. F. Black, John H. Howard and William Smith, all of whom are in the county, and Robert Connelly and Roland H. Brown.

Simonds—Thomas Carson, M. A. G. Fred Stephens and Henry Williamson, all of whom are in the county, and F. J. Rafferty and Fred McLeod.

Lancaster—William Golding and J. A. Bryant, both in the county, and W. A. Quinton, Andrew Gregory, John Sims and John O'Brien. J. W. Long, who has been a councillor for several years, is retiring.

Musquash—W. J. Dean and James K. Corcoran, all in the county, and Fred Thompson and Oscar Hanson.

MAYOR HAS TAKEN THE MATTER UP WITH THE GOVERNMENT

Mayor Frink has been in communication with the federal department of public works at Ottawa regarding the concrete wall erected in front of the city hall, and the matter is being handled by the federal government.

SPEECH OF CHIEF EXCITES INTEREST

Winston Churchill and the Emergency — Opposition Will be Strong in House

(Canadian Press)

Montreal, Oct. 21.—The Daily Ottawa correspondent writes: Sir Wilfrid Laurier's utterances at Joliette on Saturday have caused some speculation as to the ability of the opposition to force to the front the issue of high cost of living in connection with tariff reduction.

Any remedy for the high cost of living would appear to the people in the larger urban centres, and tariff reduction is a matter that interests the west very much. It is the representation of the largest cities and the western provinces that will be considerably augmented by the redistribution bill which, presumably, will be passed at the coming session of parliament.

If it should happen that Hon. Winston Churchill's offer of a year's holiday in naval construction should be accepted by Germany, the argument of an emergency used by the government here would be largely discounted.

In any case the opposition would be practically as strong as before in resisting the naval bill if it is re-introduced in the same form, or in another form amounting to the same thing.

They cannot lose more than one seat in the coming by-elections, and whatever deductions may be taken from the contests in Quebec and Ontario, the fighting strength of the opposition in parliament will be unimpaired. Sir Wilfrid now intimates that the strength of the opposition is vigorously as before against the government's naval policy.

The coming session, therefore, while likely to be so strenuous for the government, may have some interesting developments.

ENGLISH GIRLS JOIN HOME CHUMS AND ARE MARRIED IN BROCKTON

Brockton, Oct. 21.—Four young persons, playmates in Leicester, England, from their early youth till nine weeks ago, when two of them came to this country to prepare a home for the others, were united through a double marriage ceremony performed in the rectory at St. Paul's church here last week.

Misses Maud Louise Wickstead, twenty-five years old, and Gertrude Clapton, twenty-four years old, both of Leicester, the brides of the double marriage, arrived in Boston on the steamer Arctic. They were met at the station by their brother Arthur Ward, twenty-nine years old, and John Cann, twenty-four years old, both natives of Leicester, who came to this city nine weeks ago to establish themselves in employment here.

The quartette hastened from the boat to Brockton, where all plans had been arranged for their marriage.

Rev. David B. Matthews, pastor of St. Paul's church, performed the ceremony in his rectory in the presence of many friends of the contracting parties. The honeymoon will be spent automobiling throughout this section of the state.
