Another Fire in Montreal—The Cattle Trade of Manitoba Suffers From the States.

Halifax, Nov. 24.—The steamer Marian, after making a search at the scene of the wreck, confirms the loss of the Norwegian steamer Turbin of Blackledge, with all hands on board.

Montreal, Nov. 24.—The four-story stone building occupied by LaJeunesse & Duclos, produce merchants, the Montreal Hat & Cap Manufacturing Co., and J. H. Malden, manufacturer, Dyouville square, this city, was gutted by fire last night.

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ELECTIONS MAY BE POSTPONED

IF BALFOUR DECIDES TO RESIGN AT PRESENT

Campaign Not Likely to be Commenced Until January—Liberal Leader's Speech in Ireland.

London, Nov. 23.—There was tremendous activity in political circles to-day, consequent on the circulation of a well-founded report that Premier Balfour had decided to bring his ministry to a close and to directly or indirectly appeal to the country.

All political interest now centres in the cabinet meeting to be held to-morrow at which it is understood the situation will be discussed.

Conservative papers are in favor of the resignation of the cabinet, which will place Liberals in the defensive.

Refused a Hearing.

Speech by Liberal Leader.

Stirling, Scotland, Nov. 23.—Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, leader of the Liberal party, speaking here to-night, said that the air had been cleared to some extent by Premier Balfour, when, addressing the national union of Conservative associations at St. Andrew's-on-Tyne, he said: "I am not afraid of the opposition, but of my own friends."
