OVERSEA—The Schr "Safe" of Yarmouth N.S., Capt. Purdy, is frozen in the ice in Lower Bay-du-Vin Bay. There are about 300 barrels of oysters on board; which her Capt. is to have landed at Chatham, for shipment to St. John.

INQUIRY—The season for small fishing opened yesterday and the quantity caught after twelve o'clock on Tuesday night must have been immense, if we are to judge by the quantities in the hands of different shippers at an early hour yesterday morning. They could be computed by tons.

LOOS—The quantity of logs rafted by Jas. Robinson, Esq. leasee of the South-west Boom, during the season of 1880 was 44,000,000 superficial feet. About 60,000,000 sup. ft. were rafted last year. About 15,000,000 sup. ft. were rafted outside of the Boom limits this year.

THE "CANADA LUMBERMAN" comes to regularly and makes a good appearance. It is matter of more general than usual in specialty papers, but this will, no doubt, be only until it is stiff and corresponds are fairly in harness, referring to the delayed delivery on the Miramichi it says:—

This arises from the fact that the greater portion of the logs are now cut on a small stream far from the main waterway of the Miramichi, and in spring especially, when there is not much snow, as was the case last winter, the water is so scarce

that thousands have to remain until the fall rains.

The above conveys a very erroneous impression, as the lumber supply of the river comes from a hundred or more different small streams and branches. It may also be remarked that the delayed delivery was hung up quite as much by the "Ice and water" policy of some of those interested in it as by low water. It is to be hoped that the lesson enshrined in the results of that operation will not be lost upon the trade here.

Death of Hon. John A. Beckwith.—Hon. John A. Beckwith, died at his residence, Fredericton, at four o'clock on Tuesday morning. The event was not altogether unexpected, as Mr. Beckwith had been for some time seriously ill, and had, moreover, reached the advanced age of nearly eighty years. The Evening Telegraph says: "The deceased gentleman was widely and justly known as a public man. He had in his time held a great many public trusts in connection with his native city of Fredericton, the Government of the Province, and various public corporations, in all of which he served with ability, diligence and fidelity. He was long prominently connected with the Orange Association, in which he held the position of Deputy Grand Master at the time of his death. He had been at various times respectively, Mayor of Fredericton, Deputy Commissioner of Crown Lands, and Surveyor General of the Province. He was also a member of the Legislative Council, which position he continued to hold until his decease."

THE Obituary notice of Mr. Beckwith, in the "Globe" says: "He was a genuine Frenchman, for he was a true, noble, generous, polite, gallant, but he had also unbounded English qualities. He was plucky, determined, energetic, and a genuine lover of sport. It is, we think, within five years that he played in cricket, and played well too."

"He was Grand Master of the Orange Fraternity, and at the time of the election between Mr. Elder and Mr. Clark, issued the now historic order to the society to support Mr. Elder. The care of life at night upon Mr. Beckwith, and so he lived to a ripe old age, achieving honors if not wealth, and leaving a memory with which people will deal tenderly. It was impossible for him to be a mere political or party politician; he was a true Englishman, and a true Frenchman."

THE HON. FRANKLIN HARVEY died at his residence, St. George, on Thursday morning last, in his 70th year. Mr. Harvey was born at Halifax, removing early in his life to St. George. He was in business for a time in Shelburne. Latterly he was interested in the development of the mining industries of the province. He was elected to the Assembly in 1866, and given a seat in the Legislative Council of the Province in 1874. His second wife, who survives him, is a sister of Mr. Wilson, M. P. for Charlotte.

INCREASE OF WHITE FISH.—The Essex Board published at Windsor Ont., gives the following testimony respecting the effects of fish hatching at Sandwich:—

"Every day we hear of fresh evidences of the great good effected by the establishment of the fish hatchery at Sandwich. The main bulk of the white fish taken this season is of an average weight of a pound and a half each. There are hardly any old ones taken, showing beyond a doubt, that the hatchery has provided the catch, and that for its having been put into operation, white-biting on the Detroit River and in the lower St. Lawrence, would by this time practically have become a thing of the past. So long as the catch is made up largely of old fish, it is difficult to convince skeptics that the fry turned into the river each spring survived the dangers of young fish, and that their numbers are immense—just what we and others favorable to the enterprise at the outset predicted they would in a few years become. Even in parts of Lake St. Clair where a white fish had not been taken for a long period, they are now quite abundant. All that is necessary to bring back the old time big fish harvests here and elsewhere, is to keep up the work of the fish hatcheries to their highest capacity. The matter of supply is entirely in the hands of the authorities."

A SUCCESSFUL DAY.—At one of Mr.

Chas. Gauthier's river fisheries, two thousand white fish were taken last Monday. At the same place only three thousand were taken in the whole season of 1879.

This is gratifying news to the public and must be especially so to Mr. Samuel Wilmet. If his experiments with salmon could be shown to share in the success that has attended the whitefish operations, there would be a great change of sentiment in reference to a source of public supply that which is now looked upon as a great waste of money.

The Princess Louise and Canada.—From time to time rumors appear in so-called "Society" journals, announcing that Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise left Canada solely because she neither liked the country nor the people. The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Globe learns upon excellent authority that Her Royal Highness, whilst on the journey to England, several times during the voyage expressed to a distinguished passenger her profound regret at the publication of such rumors. Their publication gave her pain because, first, they were entirely devoid of foundation, and, secondly, were unjust to the Canadian people, for whom she felt the warmest affection. As for Canada, instead of despising the country her feelings towards it were entirely the reverse. Her journey to England and Continental Europe was undertaken solely upon the urgent advice of her medical attendants, who further urged her to remain there during a part of the winter, so as to restore her health from the influences of the nervous shock she experienced during the unfortunate runaway accident last winter. Her Royal Highness will probably return to Canada about the end of February.—Evening Telegraph

The Stollerton Horror.—VERDICT OF THE JURY AT THE INQUEST.—SUGGESTIONS FOR THE FUTURE.

At 1.30 o'clock to-day the jury assembled at the Court House at Fredericton, in the case of the death of Angus McGillivray. After a long consultation the jury finally decided on the following verdict:—

CONSENT OF PICTOR.—An inquest having been taken before George Murray, M. D., coroner, one of the owners for the county, in view of the body of Angus McGillivray, then and there lying dead, on the night of John McKay, foreman, A. G. McDonald, Peter Campbell, Jeffrey McGill, William Macdonald, John McKay, David McKay, Alfred Fraser, John D. Ross, R. S. McCurdy, Daniel McDougall and George McDougall, to inquire into what manner the said Angus McGillivray, on the morning of Friday, the 12th inst., came to his death in the Ford pit, coal mine of the Halifax County, in the Parish of Stollerton, in the county of York, by inhaling choke-damp, caused by a fire lamp explosion that had actually taken place an instant previously in said pit, in some unknown part of the mine, the jury, after a long and careful consideration of the evidence, find that the said Angus McGillivray, in manner and by the means aforesaid accidentally, casually and by misfortune, came to his death, and not otherwise.

SUGGESTIONS OF THE JURY.—From the evidence given in connection with the investigation of the accident in the Ford pit, in the coal mine of the Halifax County, in the Parish of Stollerton, in the county of York, in making the following findings and suggestions:—

First.—We find that the general management of the works in and at the Ford pit is in conformity with the act of the Legislature for the management and working of the mines, and that the manager, Mr. James Hudson, has in every way tried to make the pit a safe one by using all necessary precautions. Passed unanimously.

Second.—We further find that the plans of the old Dalhousie pit and bye pit, according to the evidence of the present manager and the inspector of mines, was incorrect and consequently made the Ford pit more dangerous than it otherwise would be. Passed unanimously.

Third.—We further find from the evidence of the inspector of mines that the plans of the Ford pit are not as correct as we think plans of that description should be, but that as inspector of mines was satisfied with them. Passed unanimously.

Fourth.—We further find that the foremen to whose charge the safety of the pit is entrusted do not get their orders or instructions in writing, nor are they subject to any examination in the theory of mining, but are left to their own devices, and that this will apply to all the mines in the country. Passed unanimously.

Fifth.—We further find that, for the safe condition of the mines, that there should be a monthly inspection of all coal and iron mines in the province. Passed unanimously.

Sixth.—We would further recommend that for the better management and safe working of the coal and iron mines of the province, that the province be divided into two districts, say Nova Scotia proper and Cape Breton, and that a deputy inspector be appointed for each district the same as those now performed by the inspector and that the inspector, besides having a supervision over the department should inspect all mines other than coal and iron mines in their districts at least once every month. Passed unanimously.

Seventh.—We would recommend that it should be the duty of the inspector or deputy inspector to verify the plans of all the workings of the mines in their respective districts, and have an amended copy filed in the office of the commissioners of mines at Halifax at least quarterly. Passed unanimously.

Eighth.—We would also recommend that there be a board of examiners to examine all candidates for the position of examiner, to whom on passing a satisfactory certificate of competency provided such candidate shall have served a term of three years at least in the office of the inspector, or as a collier or practically employed in a mine. Passed, Juror Alfred Fraser objecting.

Ninth.—We would also recommend that several sections of the Mining Act should be amended, under the style and firm of Perley & Co., this day dissolved by mutual consent. All debts due to any person or persons by the late firm, will be paid by Philip Perley, and he is authorized to collect all debts due the said firm. Dated at Chatham, N.B., 27th day of November, A. Tenth.—We would also recommend that when the Ford pit is again worked

the plan be at once verified in accordance with the survey, and where found incorrect be corrected; and that the question as to whether the water came into the Ford pit from Humphrey's or Muir's board in October, be tested by a series of borings, and thus to ascertain the extent, verify the plans of the old bye-pit. Passed unanimously.
