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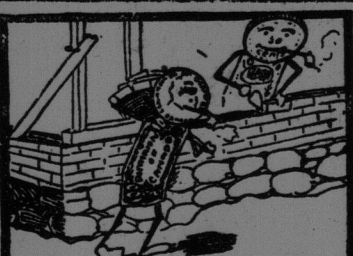

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## WORK OF PAVING GERMAIN ST. WILL SOON BE STARTED

As the result of representations made to the Board of Public Works at its regular meeting held yesterday afternoon the council will be asked to call for tenders preliminary to the paving of a portion of Germain street. A large delegation from the residents of the street appeared before the members of the board and all were in favor of the immediate prosecution of the work. Other than this, however, there was little business of an important nature transacted at the meeting.

The city engineer reported recommending that the usual vacation of the city should be held in the hands of the board.

W. E. Raymond stated that he was willing to pay his share.

Colonel Sturges stated that he thought the residents of Germain street could well allow the city to take the pavement.

A. R. Stone thought that the city should know first what the street would cost.

His worship the mayor thought that the council should first agree itself with all the information necessary.

Upon the delegation retiring, Ald. Codner moved that tenders be called for permanent pavements along the portion of Germain street in question.

The city engineer pointed out that in the event of permanent pavements being laid the water service would have to be overhauled.

The motion of Ald. Codner was put and carried.

The city engineer reported recommending that a sidewalk be laid in front of the Bank of New Brunswick, West Side at a cost of \$80 the bank to pay one-half. The city engineer also recommended that Carlton street be connected with North street. The matter was ordered laid over until the next meeting.

H. B. Schofield wrote directing the attention of the board to Seely street. The matter was referred to the engineer.

A letter was read from Manchester, Robertson and Allison asking that a by-law be enacted limiting the time for the washing of windows.

ALREADY DEALT WITH.

The chairman stated that the matter had already been dealt with by the Board of Public Safety. It was ordered referred to council.

A bill from C. W. Stewart of \$150 for making asphalt on his premises was referred to the engineer.

On motion of Ald. Sprout it was decided to purchase a new horse for the purposes of the street superintendent at the cost of \$200.

The suggestion of Ald. Baxter the engineer is to look into the matter of laying a concrete pavement on the part of Main street now being opened by the Telephone Company.

P. W. Thomson stated that as he had

Enoch Paul appeared before the committee asking for a rebate of \$14.99 paid by him in the construction of a retaining wall at his residence, Dorchester street. The chairman promised to take it up with the committee on his present return of streets.

A delegation from the Germain street residents, consisting of A. M. Skinner, Tremaine Gard, Percy W. Thomson, Lt. Col. Sturges, C. H. Peters, L. G. Crosby, A. R. Stone and W. E. Raymond, appeared before the committee on the matter of the street.

In certain districts a homestead in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homestead holder who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a preemption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
