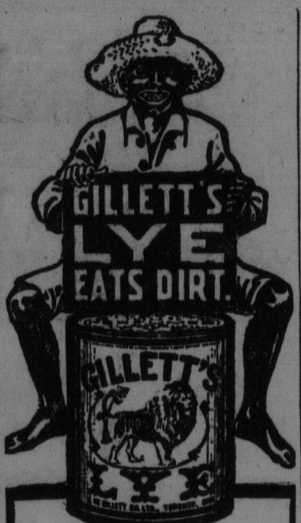

ST. MARTIN'S LIBERALS OPPOSE TO RECIPROCITY

Splendid Meeting Held There on Saturday Evening—Large Audience Applauded Telling Points Made by Dr. Daniel, Mr. Powell and Hon. Robert. Maxwell.

The Temperance Hall at St. Martin's was not only crowded to the doors on Saturday night when the two Conservative candidates and Hon. Robert Maxwell, M. P., addressed the meeting, but those unable to gain admittance to the hall listened to the able speeches outside the open windows.

The addresses were frequently interrupted by applause, and the minority of four given the late Dr. MacRae in the election of 1908 will be turned into a substantial majority for Dr. Daniel, and honest patriotic and economic government. The electors of St. Martin's have become noted for their loyalty to every British cause, and when the polls close on election day they will have recorded a large majority against Mr. Lowell the advocate of reciprocity and annexation. J. P. Mosher presided.

The feature of the meeting was the continued interruptions of the speakers by the loyal and patriotic friends, and a few of his friends, but each interruption was met by the speakers and the annexationist element led by the members of St. John county were worsted. Mr. Powell particularly scored Mr. Bentley and some of his anecdotes applicable to Mr. Bentley were well received, with cheers. At the close of the meeting cheers were given for the King, Mr. Borden and Dr. Daniel. One of Mr. Bentley's paid interrupters called for cheers for Laurier. Mr. Bentley led the cheering which was indulged in by four others.

The reciprocity and naval questions and the maladministrative record of the Laurier-Flelding annexationist government were dealt with in an able and forcible manner by each of the three speakers. In the evening the meeting was addressed by Hon. Robert Maxwell, M. P., P., the first speaker.

On rising Mr. Maxwell was greeted with applause. In opening the speaker referred to the popularity of Dr. Daniel and felt that St. Martin's would add its quota of majorities for the doctor on election day. Mr. Maxwell referred to the alleged mistake of A. P. Bentley, M. P., in a recent issue of the Telegraph, which organ the speaker humorously said was not noted for its veracity at which interview Mr. Bentley said that a large number of Conservatives in St. Martin's are leaving the party and would vote for reciprocity. Mr. Bentley would tell the member for St. John county that he was a mistake in the political color of those who had changed their politics, and that hundreds of honest

In conclusion the speaker likened the treaty unto the story of the dog crossing the stream with a piece of meat in his mouth. He asked the people to hang onto what they have. Dr. Daniel asked the electors of St. Martin's to stand by the old flag by supporting the Conservative party in the coming fight.

Mr. Powell's Fine Address. H. A. Powell, K.C., was the next speaker. He termed the people of Canada as a "barbaric and uncivilized people" and the government the prisoner at the bar.

Referring to reciprocity, Mr. Powell said that this was a "barbaric and uncivilized" policy, and that it was the duty of the government to cover up its sins.

Mr. Powell said he would admit that in 1855 we were prosperous owing to reciprocity. He thought he was sufficiently candid to satisfy any political enemy in the audience, particularly the old enemy, Mr. Bentley. "But," said Mr. Powell, "conditions since then have been changed. In that period we had but one market that was the United States. Why? Because with sailing ships, the only means of transportation at that time, we were unable to ship perishable products to the old enemy. Mr. Powell remarked that at that time we had no cold storage plants, consequently we had to send our butter, eggs, cheese and other perishable goods to the nearest market. "I defy any Liberal in this audience to prove that those conditions are applicable today," said Mr. Powell amid applause.

The speaker referred to Mr. Bentley as his personal friend and challenged him to disprove the statement which he was about to make. Said Mr. Powell: "England imports to the extent of one billion dollars of goods from the United States, and that is the very market Laurier wants us to lose by his action in refusing closer relations with the Mother Country (applause)."

Mr. Powell said that after the abrogation of the old reciprocity treaty we went to the market for a renewal of the treaty. The United States were then Anglo-Saxon and then our Anglo-Saxon goods found a market in the United States. Confederation came about and then the great National Policy of MacDonald and Tupper was brought forward. Our prosperity dated from that great event.

Mr. Patterson and His Biscuits. Dealing with the articles affected by the pact, Mr. Powell said some of them were trimmed. He said that Hon. William Patterson is one of the largest biscuit and flour manufacturers in Canada and a very shrewd man for he firmly squatted on his biscuit box and trimmed only 2 1/2 per cent. off the duty which formerly was 35 per cent.

Speaking about the potato question, Mr. Powell asked Mr. Bentley the selling price of potatoes in the autumn. Mr. Bentley replied that when there was a fair crop the farmer had more than he wanted and was unable to find a market. Mr. Powell: "Then sir, how will our farmers sell their surplus supply if reciprocity comes into effect, and the Maine farmers flood our markets?" Mr. Bentley did not reply.

The speaker then gave a comparative statement of the price of potatoes in Maine, Michigan and New Brunswick showing that potatoes are cheaper in the United States and asked where the New Brunswick potato grower would benefit by the lowering of the tariff wall.

Discussing the effect of reciprocity on the price of potatoes in the autumn, Mr. Powell showed that if the pact was endorsed by the people, the trade would flow north and south. He said that if the very best of the New Brunswick potatoes were sent to the United States, the price of potatoes in St. John would stand as silent as the stone dogs upon the walls of the ancient city.

Mr. Powell's quotations, to wait until the next morning, Mr. Bentley observed that the speaker's quotations were not exact. Mr. Powell observed that Mr. Bentley was accusing him of a repetition of which he (Bentley) has been guilty.

Here Mr. Bentley showed some temper but as the audience seemed to be against him he subsided. The speaker then dealt with Laurier's "import duty" question, and in conclusion brought the audience to a realization of when he appealed to their patriotism and loyalty to the Old Flag.

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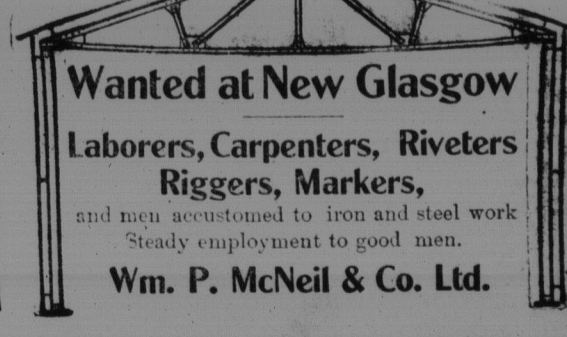
