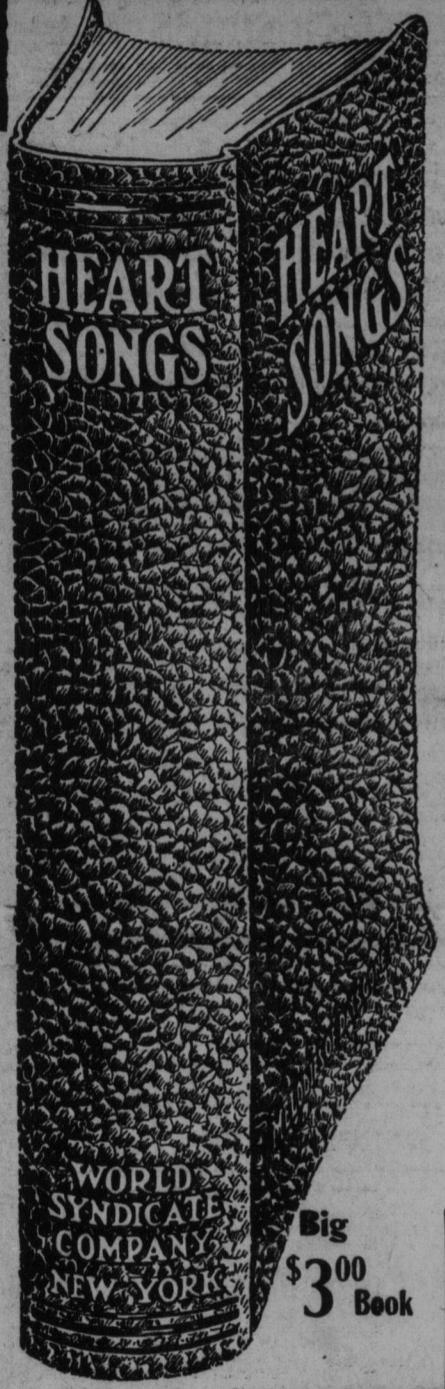

HOW WOMEN ARE MAKING IT POSSIBLE FOR MEN TO JOIN THE ARMY

London, Feb. 21—Over 100,000 women
up to now have taken the places of
men in British industrial life, releas-
ing as many men for service in the
army. These figures have been com-
piled by the statistical department of
the board of trade, and fall short of
the correct total, as many firms have
not yet made their returns.
Women now predominate in fac-
tories which they never entered before
the war, and work metal lathes and
drills, quite like old hands.
