## MCGOWAN CAPTURED AMERICAN OUTDOOR SKATING CHAMPIONSHIP

Took Title Away from Arthur Staff at Saranac Lake by Ten Points—Staff Established New World's Record for Three Quarter Mile Event.

Saranac Lake, Feb. 16.—Everett McGowan, of St. Paul, Minn., captured the American outdoor skating championship title from Arthur Staff, of Chicago, here today. McGowan scored 170 points in the three days' meet which ended today, and Staff scored 160. Edmund Lamy, of Saranac Lake, finished third, with 109 points, and Bobby McLean, of Chicago, scored 60 points.

In winning the three-quarter mile race in two minutes 2.5 seconds, Staff established a new world's record for the distance, clipping off two seconds from the time made by Lamy at Cleveland in 1914, when the Saranac Lake veteran was an amateur.

Before the five mile race, the final event on the card, Staff led the field with 160 points, while McGowan had 140. Toward the end of the gruelling contest Lamy shot into the lead, closely followed by McGowan, who finally passed the local skater, with Lamy coming in second, while McGowan was shattered. Staff's hopes of taking third place from him, however, were dashed.

Staff won the 220 yards race, with McGowan second and Lamy third, owing to an unintentional foul by McGowan, in interfering with Lamy who in turn upset McGowan, the race was skated over by McGowan, McLean, Lamy and Ben O'Sickey, of Cleveland, to decide second and third place. McGowan won, with Lamy second.

In the three-quarter mile race Lamy fell at the last turn while contesting with Staff for the lead, and slid off the ice.

Claudius Lamy, of Saranac Lake, defeated T. Carl Milne, of Plattsburg, in the barrel jumping championship. Thousands attended the races today, despite the fact that the temperature was ten degrees below zero, and a sharp wind blew from the north.

Amendments To Playing Rules.

Montreal, Feb. 16.—Officers of the Montreal Hockey Association, affiliated with the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association have forwarded to the secretary of the A. H. A., a number of amendments to the playing rules of the game. They are as follows:

That a committee be appointed to revise the playing rules of amateur hockey.

That the rules be changed to read that the teams shall play two periods of thirty minutes each with a rest of ten minutes between the periods, instead of playing three periods of twenty minutes each.

To eliminate the line that forms the goal keeper's territory and that the goal keeper be allowed to stop the puck in any way he sees fit.

That no player other than the goal keeper shall be allowed to go down a side knee in the goal.

## Failed To Lower The Track Record

Norval Baptie's Record of 14.58, Made Twenty Years Ago for Five Miles, Still Holds Good.

Saranac Lake, N. Y., Feb. 16.—The professionals failed today to lower the track record of 14.58 for five miles made twenty years ago by Norval Baptie of Winnipeg. The time today was 15.50. Baptie skated the full race and was strong to the finish. He failed to place, however, Miss Gladys Robinson, of Toronto, international woman's champion, skated the 440 in 46 seconds, paced by William Murphy, of New York. Emery Stephenson of Toronto failed to place in the three mile race.

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## Mount Allison Defeated Acadia

Maritime Inter-Collegiate Hockey League Game Won at Sackville by Score of Six to One.

Sackville, N. B., Feb. 16.—A different complexion was given to the Maritime inter-collegiate hockey league when Mount Allison defeated Acadia here tonight by 6 to 1. As a result of the victory all the institutions on college hill are celebrating and making plans for a general holiday tomorrow.

Tonight was Mount Allison's night. The hard-ice gave her speedy form, and their slower opponents could not stand their terrific pace. This with the phenomenal work of Appleby, Mount Allison's goalie, tells the story of the game.

Neil Wilkie, of Halifax, called the race-off about 8.30 and after a few minutes of play, Mount Allison was on the ice tonight, scored for Mt. A. Clark for Acadia evened up in about three minutes. Play remained even for the rest of the period, neither side scoring. Score at the end of the first period, Mount A. 1, Acadia 1.

The second period furnished the banner hockey of the evening. Play opened with Mount Allison minus Glennie who had been sent to the penalty box for two minutes just as the long rang shot for the close of the first period. With Glennie on again Mount A. rushed the play. Pickard soon made a fine nut but was forced in behind Acadia's goal.

## American Dogs Win Over The English

Home Bred Airedales and Collies on Top at Madison Square Garden Show.

New York, Feb. 16.—The rough collie Bellhaven Stabat Strongheart was awarded the winners' ribbon over a big entry of one of the best lot of collies ever bunched in New York. This lovely sable and white dog was placed over the big entry of Mrs. Lunt-Alsted Kennels, also her own very good imported one, Bellhaven Land Logic, one of England's best, which won at this show, first open dogs (sable and white), and first, open (any color), but took second place to the kennel mate, B. Stabat Strongheart.

Best in collie bitches, and winner went to the Alsted Kennels, with their Seely Queen, a very fine English imported sable and white.

Best of the tri-color bitches was Mr. and Mrs. Schwing's, Ormakirk Peacefull, with E. P. Yapple's Seely Blue Bloem, best in the blue merle class.

The same owner has not all the complete awards in classes of the Airedales, Joseph Russell, of Toronto, won first in puppy dogs with his own bred Clayfield Commander, which took second place in the novice class behind P. C. Hood's Boxwood Barkentine. The latter won first novice open and winners' dog over one of the largest and best entry of Airedales shown at the Garden. Mr. Hood is one of America's most consistent breeders of the big terriers, always a strong contender with his entries.

The same owner with his Boxwood Bashful, also American bred, went through to winners and met her kennel mate for best of the breed, and went up over the youthful aspirant as Boxwood Barkentine is just twenty months old. This youngster beat a lot of good ones, including Warland Tit Bt and Warland Ditto, both English champions, the latter a winner at the Specialty Show last week and owned by Mrs. Anita Baldwin, who came to the show from California in two private cars, one for her and the other for herself and party.

Best puppy bitch was Master Jack Swanwith his Canadian bred Parkdale Rose, whose teenage won much commendation on his handling and condition of the show.

W. C. Baldwin, of Ottawa, won in American foxhounds with his Baldwin Heffin that is claimed one of the best in America.
