**NEW BANK MANAGER.**

Atlin Man Takes Charge of the Local Merchants' Bank Branch.

A change was made in the management of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax at this place during the week, W. A. Spencer, formerly in charge of the Atlin branch, being transferred to Grand Forks, while Mr. Craig, who has been in charge of the bank here, goes to Rossland.

Mr. Spencer arrived in the city on Monday, and at once entered upon his duties. Mr. Craig expects to leave for Rossland on this afternoon's train.

The Bank is moving this afternoon to its new home in the Sheeds building, which has been finely fitted up, and which will make an excellent location. This move will only be temporary, as it is almost certain the bank will build on its lot at the corner of Bridge and First streets during the coming year.

Mr. Craig, the retiring manager, has made many friends during his short stay here, and it is with much regret that we see him depart—Grand Forks, B. C. Gazette, Dec. 1st.

We are all glad to learn that Mr. Spencer has got clear of the wild and dreary Atlin, and is now located in the rapidly growing town of Grand Forks, on direct line of railway, 30 or 40 miles West of Rossland. The Atlin agency of this soon-to-be "Royal Bank of Canada," is now in charge of Mr. J. H. Ferguson, a son of Hon. Senator Ferguson, of Charlottetown, P. E. Island, and who for some time was in the head office in Halifax.

The Knechtel furniture factory at Hanover, Ont., the largest in Canada, was totally destroyed by fire on the 19th inst. Many adjoining buildings were destroyed. The loss is said to be nearly one million dollars.

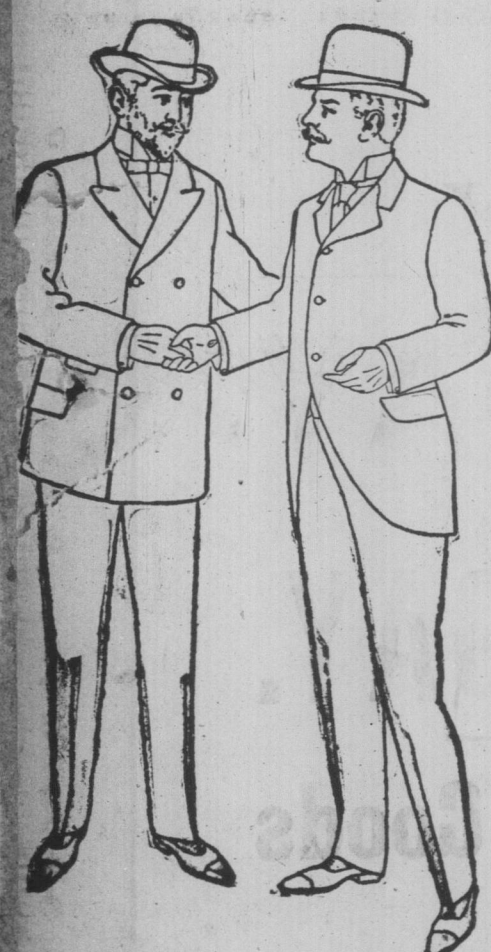

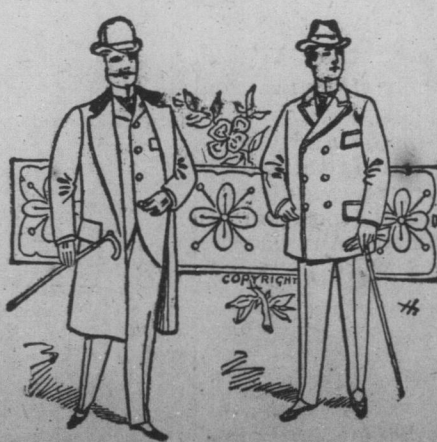
