Tariff Changes. The tariff changes are not very many. A bounty is offered for the manufacture of cordage from Manila fibre. The dumping clause is extended to cover binder twine from New Zealand hemp. Mining machinery, not made in Canada, is on the free list. Sugar must be imported direct by vessel to get preferential duty. Turpentine is on the free list. There is an increase in duty on potatoes and tomatoes. Boiler plate is made free. Printing presses and type setting machinery 5 per cent preferential and 10 per cent for intermediate and general tariff. Windmills preferential 12 1/2, intermediate 17 1/2, general 20 per cent. Portable engines come in under 15, 17 1/2 and 20 per cent duty. There are about 40 changes in the whole tariff, and none are of any very marked importance.
