

resulted in the coalition of that year, and the adoption of the Confederation policy which he had long previously advocated. He obtained the appointment of a Committee to devise a better system of registering births, marriages and deaths in U. C., and reported that the municipal system should be employed to obtain such statistics, a course likely to be adopted; he introduced, on two occasions, a bill to provide for the carrying into effect of executions within the precincts of jails—a reform which has lately been adopted both in Eng. and Can; he also suggested, in 1868, the formation of a public stock, to afford facilities for investments by executors, trustees and others. Sworn of the Privy Council, and appointed Minister of Inland Revenue, 16 Nov., 1869. Sat for present seat in L. A., Can., from g. e., 1861 until the Union. Returned to Commons by acclamation at last g. e., and again on his appointment to office. A Conservative.—*Ottawa ; Perth, Ont. ; Rideau Club.*

S. of the late Mr. Joseph Morrison, of Toronto; and brother of the Hon. Mr. Justice Morrison, Court of Queen's Bench, Ont. M. Miss Gillmour. Called to the Bar, U. C., in Michaelmas Term, 1844. Is a bencher of the Law Society, U. C., and a director of the Northern Railway Co., and of the Provincial Insurance Co. Sat for North Simcoe in L. A., Can., from g. e., 1854, until g. e., 1863, when defeated: and for present seat from 1864 until the Union. Was an unsuccessful candidate for North Simcoe in Local House at last g. e. Returned to Commons at last g. e. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A. Macdonald.—*Windsor Place, Toronto ; Toronto Club ; Rideau Club.*
