

## \$50,000 BLAZE AT BROCKVILLE

Fanned by High Wind the  
Flames Scourge Half of  
the Town

## RESIDENCES DESTROYED

Starting in Skating Rink, Fire  
Engulfed Large Part of  
the Residential  
Section

(Special to The Gazette.)—Brockville, Ont., April 22.—The biggest conflagration of years in Brockville broke out tonight in the covered skating rink owned by L. R. Coesitt and situated in a thickly settled portion of the town. Before the flames were gotten under control more than fifty thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed.

The burning embers were carried more than four blocks to the water front, igniting the Rowie & Co. brewery, the club house of the Brockville Rowing Club, the cowsheds of Reynolds & Co., and the George E. Shields Coal Co., the sheds of the C. P. R., and the Bow livery of Mrs. Peter Fraser, besides several residences in that zone. Bucket brigades and garden hose saved much valuable property. Notwithstanding the vigilance, the brewery and the row's of the two cowsheds were damaged, also the Fraser livery.

The rain which had been threatening for a week came down at 11 o'clock.
