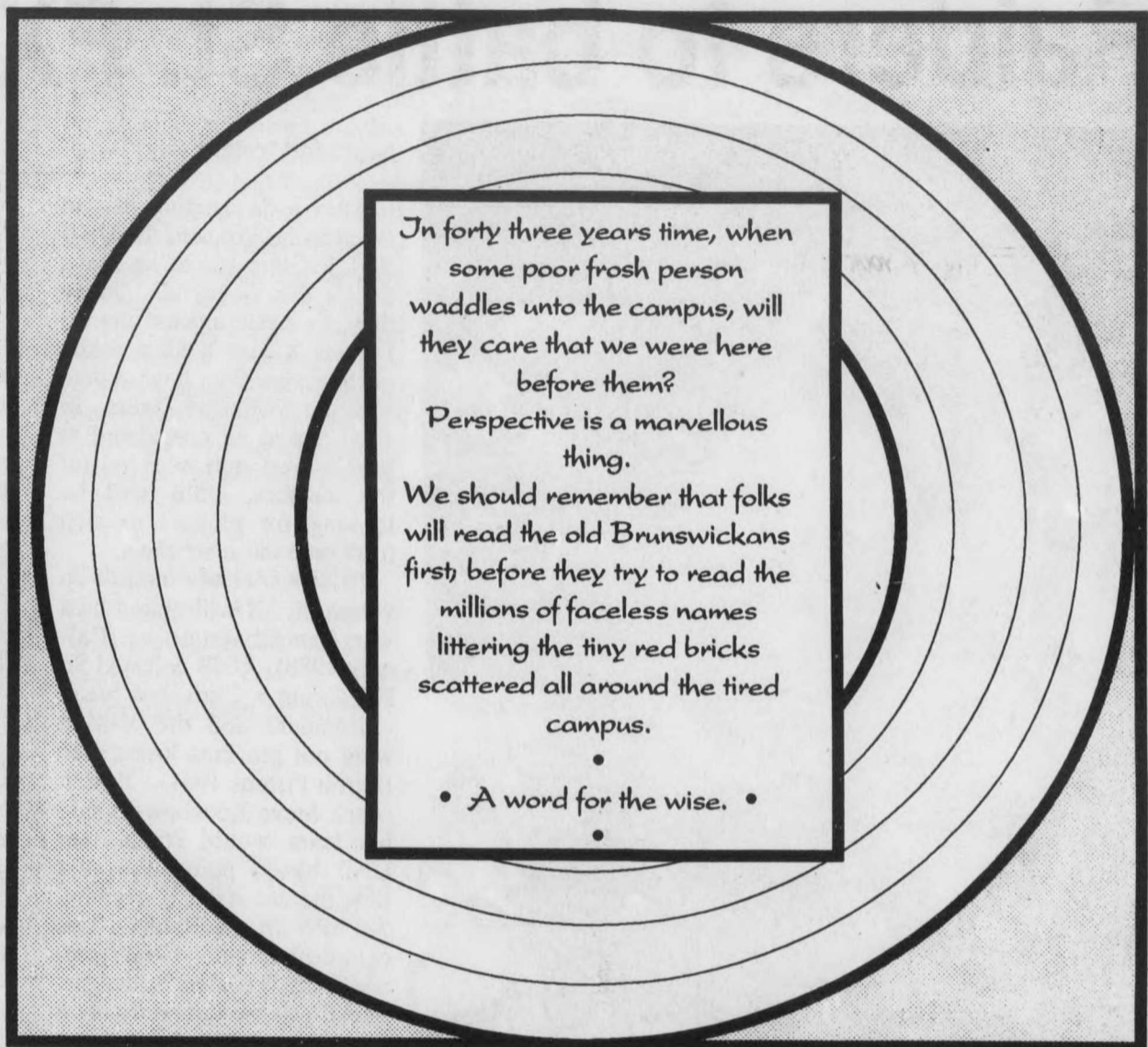
The reasons most arguments
