Chef's salad

- 1 cup strips of imported Holland Edam or Gouda cheese
- 2 tomatoes; French dressing
- 1 cup diced cold potato
- 1 small head lettuce
- 1/2 cup sliced radishes
- 1/4 green pepper
- 1/2 small Spanish onion
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley; 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate (optional). Cut about 4 ounces cheese into 1/4-inch-thick slices, then cut slices into strips about 1/4-inch wide and 1 1/2 inches long. Peel tomatoes and cut into

large dice; add to cheese. Add the potato. Drizzle with 1/4 cup French dressing and toss lightly; let marinate in refrigerator 1/2 to 1 hour. Cut lettuce into cubes. Prepare radishes. Cut pepper into thin strips. Cut onion into thin slices; separate slices into rings. Add cheese mixture, prepared lettuce, radishes, green pepper, onion and parsley; sprinkle with monosodium glutamate, if used. Toss lightly, moistening with French dressing. Serve immediately. Yield — 8 servings
