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the view that parliament should be called in the first instance and that its consent would have to be obtained before any forces should be permitted to go abroad to serve in conjunction with other military forces."

"I hope the time will never come when this parliament will have again to discuss war. But if it ever has to discuss war, I submit that is the time above all others when parliament should be called together and the decision as to the action to be taken not left to the governor in council. If the Prime Minister is retaining this clause which deals with peace, order and good government in order that he may have the power, notwithstanding any statute or law, to have this country participate in a war, there is a stronger reason than ever why the clause should be stricken out."
