

- Q. You didn't notice any excitement or tension in the hut?

- Q. You say that on the 8th May you saw the accused again?
A. That's correct sir.
- Q. Whereabouts?
A. In front of #6 Cell Block.
- Q. Where were you standing when you saw this?
A. Along between 4 & 5 Cell Blocks.
- Q. Were you in the passageway?
A. No, right in the corner between the two Cell Blocks.
