

THE Rev. Charles Crichton was born at Auchinlech, Ayrshire, Scotland, in the year 1847, and came with his parents to Canada in 1850. He was educated at the Public School, Woodstock, and at Rockwood Academy and Albert College, Belleville. In 1871 he was received as a probationer into the Niagara conference of the M. E. Church. His first appointment was to the Troy circuit. At the end of two years he was ordained deacon by the late Bishop Richardson. In 1874 he completed his conference course of study, and was ordained elder by Bishop Carman, now general superintendent of the Methodist Church.

The following circuits were travelled by Mr. Crichton: Troy, Brant, Springfield, Nissouri, St. Mary's, Humberstone, Ridgeway, Blenheim, Brantford, Portage la Prairie, Crystal City, Romney, Goldsmith, Malahide and Avon. While at Avon his activities were cut short by a breakdown in his health, and he was compelled to retire from the ministry.

THE Rev. George Buggin was born in England in 1832, and came to Canada in 1857. He entered the ministry of the New Connexion Methodist Church in 1860, and travelled the following circuits: Durham, Omemece, Mauvey, Waterford, London, Seaforth, Mount Forest, Elora, Drayton, Markdale, Tara, Blyth, Wallaceburg, Brownsville, Avon, and Thedford, embracing a period of 46 years. He was superannuated in 1906.
