THIS YEAR'S BANK RETURNS

Show a Steady Increase in Circulation Deposits Rising \$40,000,000.

No Diminution of the Business Prosperity of Canada—Interesting Statements of President Clouston.

Montreal, Nov. 14.—The annual meeting of the Canadian Bankers' Association was convened at the Windsor Hotel this morning, E. S. Clouston, the president, in the chair. Mr. Clouston, in the course of his annual address, referred to the banking legislation, which went into operation not long ago, but stated that it has not yet been long enough in force to get into proper working order. The bank returns since the last annual meeting, he said, showed a steady increase in circulation, having expanded \$5,000,000, while deposits have risen \$40,000,000, and there is \$14,000,000 more on loan available for the business requirements of the country. Referring to the general conditions of the country, Mr. Clouston said that the business prosperity, which commenced in 1897, was as yet undiminished. It was a striking sign that in five years the money value of imports and exports had been enhanced 60 per cent. The association concluded its meeting to-day by electing the following officers for the ensuing year: Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal and George Hays, Honorary Presidents; D. R. Wills, E. G. The next general meeting of the association will take place in Toronto on Nov. 14, 1902.

LOST AN ARM.

Glencoe, Ont., Nov. 14.—About four o'clock, to-day, Charles, the 10-year-old son of John Clarke, lost his right arm while amusing himself by jumping on and off of a shunting train. The boy caught a slowly moving car which started with a jerk, throwing him under the wheels and badly crushing his arm above the elbow. He was carried home, and there the arm was amputated near the shoulder. The child endured the pain very manfully, and is getting on nicely, although very weak from loss of blood. It is a peculiar coincidence that the boy's father, when young, lost his arm by being thrown under a moving train.

WORSE THAN REPORTED.

London, Nov. 15.—The condition of Queen Wilhelmina, according to a despatch to the Standard from Brussels, is worse than has been officially represented. Three physicians are in attendance upon Her Majesty, and the Queen mother has been summoned. The royal patient will be obliged to keep her couch for six weeks.

A TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE

Over 160 Persons Drowned During the Storm on the British Coast.

Further Reports of Shipping Disasters—A Lifeboat Crew Perishes Going to Rescue Distressed Vessel.

London, Nov. 14.—The loss of a lifeboat and eleven lives, near Yarmouth heads the list of to-day's wrecks by the continued gale. The lifeboat was on its way to the rescue of a distressed vessel when it was struck by a great wave and capsized. The crew were imprisoned, and only three of them succeeded in making their escape.

Innumerable minor casualties continue to be reported on all the coasts of the United Kingdom, marking the storm as the most disastrous that has occurred in many years. Snow is falling in many parts of the country.

An incomplete list of the persons who have lost their lives by drowning during the storm, already aggregated over 160.

The Norwegian bark Erratic, of Christiansand, has been wrecked in the vicinity of Saltburn, and eight members of her crew have been drowned.

A Belfast despatch says:—From wreckage seen in Belfast Lough to-day, it is supposed that the collier White Abbey has been lost and the crew of nine drowned.

London, Nov. 15.—It is still impossible to estimate the loss of life and property resulting from the protracted gale, and probably the full extent of the damage will never be known.

Tons of wreckage of unidentified vessels are still being thrown up. Altogether it is known that some 50 vessels have been wrecked along the British coasts. Thirty-four of these have been absolute wrecks, involving, it is said, a loss of more than 180 drowned. The Yarmouth lifeboat disaster leaves 44 fatherless children.

AFTER OFFICE

Many Want to be Deputy Collector of Inland Revenue at Windsor.

Windsor, Nov. 15.—There is a strong probability that a dark horse will be appointed to the position of deputy collector inland revenue at Windsor. The gentleman's name is Israel Marion, of Tilbury township. There has been a greater number of candidates for the office than for any other in the gift of the Government at Windsor. The applicants are not alone confined to the officers now in the service, but to a small army of political workers from both North and South Essex. Each man has had his case stated, both to R. F. Sutherland, the member for North Essex, and to the Government at Ottawa.

Some time ago the executive committee of the North Essex Liberals held a meeting in Windsor and, although there was but one Windsor man present, it was decided to recommend Marion for the position. Acting on the advice of the committee, R. F. Sutherland immediately sent Mr. Marion's name to the Government, but so far no action has been taken by the powers at Ottawa.

Some of the other candidates for the position, learning of the action of the executive committee, have made a vigorous kick, both to the Government and to Sutherland, and this is given as one of the reasons why the appointment is still in the air. It is understood that the heads of the department at Ottawa object to placing a man in such a position without any previous training for the office. The Windsor politicians object to Marion's appointment on the ground that very few city men are selected for city jobs.

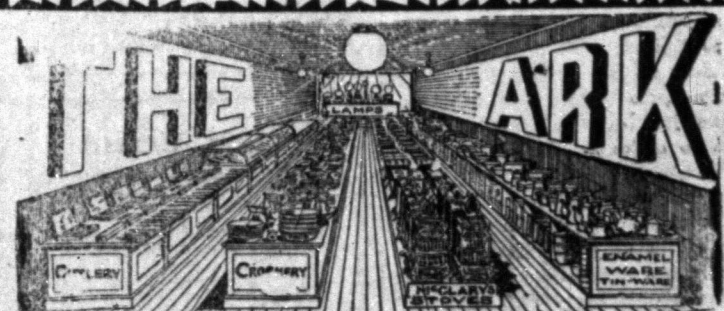
GOOD NEWS

War Office Said to have Received in From Kitchener.

New York, Nov. 14.—A London cable says:—There are rumors of favorable advices received by the War Office from South Africa, but nothing definite.

London, Nov. 14.—An interview with an Austrian merchant who has just returned from South Africa is reported by the Vienna correspondent of the Times. The merchant believes the war will last another six months, but does not think the Boers will hold out beyond next June. He believes they would be glad to make peace if they obtained substantial autonomy. He says the British should not allow the burghers to retain gold mine regions, which should be permanently under British rule. This observer also declares that Kruger kept up the Afrikaner Bund by wealth derived from the gold industry. He says if Kruger loses his money he will soon lose his friends.
