THE PLEBISCITES.

Full returns have now been received of the voting in the different Provinces. The result is an endorsation of the principle of prohibition to a greater extent than was anticipated by even the prohibitionists. In every case very large majorities were polled. As our readers know, the voting had no immediate legislative effect, being simply a declaration by ballot, of the electors, of their favor for, or disapproval of the total prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquor. The dates of voting and votes polled for and against prohibition, are as ollows:—
