In reality they're not doing thing of the kind, and don't need that which happened and never happened, Laurier brought upon own head.

He was neatly out manoeuvred a perfectly legitimate way under rule which Sir Wilfrid himself deduced one year ago.

In other words he got the cliche which he had prepared to Conservatives, if occasion arose when he realized the situation commenced to fume and rave.

Just listen to this talk of his "Let me repeat to my Hon. friend the Prime Minister as you are fair, so shall you with fairness; as you are unjust shall you meet with injustice you sow, so shall you reap, poison that you offer us to-day come to your own lips at some future day. We are in the mire we can be gagged; we can be vented from expressing our opinions; you can trample upon bodies." But, sir, the day of coming will come, and it will be as soon as we have a dissolution of the present Parliament.
