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Wellington

ONE hundred and forty-four years ago today the Duke of Wellington was born. The Duke's real name was Arthur Wellesley, but he did not use it very long, as every time he won a battle the English Parliament would call him several kinds of a viscount or baronet, and in the latter years of his life he had to get out new visiting cards every other month. He was a gaunt, severe man, and lived mostly on popular acclaim and rare beefsteak for both of which he had a 60-horse power appetite.

Wellington was born in a castle in Ireland and his profession in life was the whipping the French army whenever he met it. The castle was a poor place to live in, as it did not have a bath room or a vacuum cleaner, and Wellington soon went to Eton college, later on to a military school in France, where he learned to perfume his conversation with some of the most popular French quotations.

As soon as Wellington was out of school he started in pursuit of the French army, which was roaming around Spain and attacking people who didn't know the Champs d'Elysees from a new 5-cent cigar. Wellington went over to Spain for the purpose of conducting the funeral of several thousand French soldiers, and by the time he got through the flower of the French army looked like a frosted asparagus bed.

Wellington was about to retire and commiserate with the goat when Napoleon broke out of Elba and went on the warpath. The English people did not like Napoleon's manners, or his blunt style of doing business, and they implored Wellington to go and head him off before he captured Hyde Park and the property owners about thereon. Wellington sent a polite note to Napoleon, requesting him to stand back up, or words to that effect, and on the latter's refusal to do either he took several of the English militia and started for the field of Waterloo.

Napoleon had 130,000 men to Wellington's 72,000, but Napoleon's army was nourished on cream puffs and orange blanc munge and was opposed to fighting on an empty stomach. Nevertheless it took Wellington three days to convince Napoleon that his star was about to set with a bitter plunk, and then it was a reinforcement of Prussian soldiers that turned the trick.

BRYAN FAILS IN CALIFORNIA

Anti-Jap Legislation is Cause of Great Worry to Federal Authorities.

(Canadian Press Despatch)

SACRAMENTO, Cal. April 30.—If the purpose of the visit of Secretary Bryan was to check further action by the legislature on an alien land law directed against the Japanese his mission has been a failure.

The conference between Secretary Bryan and legislators closed just before midnight, within three minutes, and before the start of the spectators knew what occurred. Senator A. E. Boynton, president pro tem of the Upper House, convened the Senate and an amended land bill, which provides that no alien who is ineligible to citizenship under the laws of the United States, may inherit property in California, was adopted as a substitute for the pending measure by unanimous viva voce vote.

It will come up for final passage in the regular course of business tomorrow morning and probably will be approved when it comes to Governor Johnson it will be signed. That is the opinion of the leaders. The new bill is drawn in strict conformity with the treaty between Japan and the United States, but all efforts to secure an opinion from Secretary Bryan or President Wilson failed and the state leaders decided forthwith to proceed with their plans for enacting it into law.

Secretary Bryan brought into the final conference last night further messages from President Wilson, but they met with no response from the legislators. At the close of the secret meeting Governor Johnson and a number of the administration leaders said their opinion remained unchanged.

President Wilson's messages were in the form of replies to questions asked by Secretary Bryan on the preceding day. In answer to the question as to the effect of a law containing the words: "Ineligible to citizenship" would have upon the federal government, President Wilson sent the following to Secretary Bryan:

"I can only say that I cannot assume that the representations heretofore made to the Governor and the legislature and which your presence in Sacramento must necessarily have

A Raid Made in London Today on Suffragette Headquarters.

LONDON, April 30.—The headquarters of the Women's Social and Political Union, the militant suffragettes society, situated in Kingsway, were raided in search of evidence against the militant leaders by a squad of police commanded by Superintendent Patrick Quinn of Scotland Yard, who had been placed in charge of the department for dealing with the suffragettes.

Miss Barbara Kerr, the secretary of the Women's Social and Political Union, Misses Lake, Lennox and Barnett and Mrs. Saunders, all of whom are officials of the society and were in charge of offices at the time of the raid, were arrested, while a large quantity of documents was seized. Severe typists and other clerks were ordered to leave the premises, which were then closed and policemen left on guard. The women arrested are to be charged with conspiracy or with having committed offences contrary to the clauses of the Malicious Damages Act.

Were Violent

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, Eng., April 30.—A violent attack was made today by a party of anti-suffragettes on a shop and offices used as the headquarters of the Women's Social and Political Union here. Bricks were hurled through the windows and all the desks in the place were broken, while quantities of suffrage literature and banners were destroyed.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been domiciled in Saskatchewan or Alberta, and whose name appears in the list of the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, may obtain a quarter section of land, or any other amount of land, under certain conditions, by "father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader."

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within three miles of the land in each of three years. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights may, by purchase, obtain a quarter section, or any other amount of land, under certain conditions, by "father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader."

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Was Killed Fatal Accident Happened in Town of Preston.

GALT, Ont., April 30.—Benjamin Kennedy, aged about 30, was killed this morning in the lumber yard of James Gillies, Preston, near here. Kennedy was a brakeman on the G. E. & H. Railway. There had been a small fire in the Gillies yards, and the motor on which he was working was stalled by a hose across the track. Kennedy went over to the scene of the fire, when he saw the motor starting away without him. He ran to catch it, but just as he was about to spring on he tripped and fell beneath.
