AMBULANCE IS "SOME BUS"

Don't All Try to be First to Ride in the New Conveyance

"Ald. Burrows and myself are perfectly satisfied with the new ambulance now that it has been installed in the fire station," said Ald. Hill to The Courier this morning. "There has been a lot of hard work connected with the business, but we are confident that we have finally succeeded in getting an ambulance

which is a credit to the city and indeed to the province."

The ambulance, which is thoroughly up-to-the-minute in both construction and equipment, was built by Greer and Son, of London, Ont. The chassis is of Dodge manufacture, painted a battleship grey; the interior is spacious and furnished with a view to providing every possible comfort for patients. So luxuriously, in fact, is the vehicle equipped, that some alarm is felt lest there be a stampede of citizens eager for the honor of having the first ride.

The ambulance is to be kept at the Central Firehall, and can be summoned at any time by telephoning 154. All calls will be promptly

answered. A charge of \$2 per trip within the city will be made, and of 50 cents per mile or fraction thereof, outside the city.

O'LEARY SAYS HE'S LOYAL

New York, July 11.—Jeremiah O'Leary, indicted for conspiracy to commit treason, took the stand today as a witness for his brother, John, at the re-trial of John O'Leary on the charge of aiding Jeremiah to flee justice.

The witness was questioned by the prosecution as to his alleged anti-British and pro-Irish sympathies from which he is charged with having conspired with Germans and Sinn Fein sympathizers to destroy

British ships. He said that as editor of The Ball he had devoted his time and talent to the Irish question, because he wished the United States to assist in freeing Ireland. He insisted he was a loyal American, had no hatred for English men and women, was opposed to German imperialism and believed in an efficient army and navy, but only to defend the United States.

CANADA'S NET DEBT

Ottawa, July 12.—Canada's total net debt the end of June was \$1,254,718 and not \$840,973,667, as stated in a Canadian Press Limited dispatch yesterday. The debt stood at the last mentioned figure on June 30, 1917, but it has since passed the billion dollar. For the month of June the debt increased to \$3,772,087 or a sum approximately five millions less than the war expenditure for the month. The increase for June in the net debt is considerably lower than the average for the 12 months ending June 30, the increase for the year \$314,024,548, an average of over twenty millions per month.
