Making Sweeping Changes in the Disposition of Their Windy City Properties.

Chicago, Aug. 2.—The Record says: Trinity Methodist church took action last night which is expected to result ultimately in the organization in Chiago of a great industrial church modeled after the famous Metropolitan tabernacle of New York.

The institutional church is to con-rol Methodist deninominational property valued at \$2,000,000 on the south side, embracing the following: First Methodist church, Clark and Wash-Fourteenth street; Wabash avenue and Fourteenth street property; Trinity church property, Indiana avenue and Thirteenth street; Marie Chapel, Wentworth avenue and Twenty-third street training school for home, foreign and city missions, Indiana avenue and Fifth street; Wesley hospital and Northwestern medical school, and two

The first step in the direction of this weeping amalgamation was the auy voted to the trustees of the organization to purchase the Fifth Presbyterian property on Indiana avenue and Thirteenth street, paying therefor \$15,000, The trustees of Trinity were enthusiastic, but reti-cent. President Higginbotham said: "It'l is a sweeping undertaking - the greatest ever attempted by a denomnation in the west.'

THE BUCKET SHOPS

hicago Were Effectively Raided by the Police.

Nearly 400 Arrests Made - One Tried to Commit Suicide.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Nearly 400 per-sons, many of whom had hever seen the inside of a police station, were arested in a wholesale raid made on the bucket shops in the down-town district, and carted off to the police stations. One prisoner, whose name was not learned, attempted to each his life rath-er than face the humiliation of arrest. He tried to strangle himself with a towel, but was discovered and bundled into the patrol. A panic ensued in the rooms of E. A. Wirsching & Co., when the police appeared, and several persons were trampled on in the mad

rush to escape.

Chief of Police Kipley said that yes terday's action by the police was but the beginning of a series of raids which would continue until every al-

driven out of existence.
