#### FOR PEACE

Overtures Have Been Made by Holland to the British Government.

London, Jan. 28.-In the House of ons to-day Mr Balfour, the leader of the government announced that a communication relating to peace overtures had been received on Saturday from the government of Holland and was now being considered. No overtures, however, had been received from anyone with authority to conduct negotiations on behalf of the Boers. The communication from Holland, and the government's reply would shortly be submitted to the

Mr. Balfour's statement surprised the House, although nobody had given credence to the diplomatic denials of the significance of the recent visit of Dr. von Kuyper, the Netherlands Prime Minister, to London. The re-port immediately gained belief that the Boers had abandoned their claim to independence, and were putting an mmediate amnesty in place of that claim, There was a marked feeling of optimism in the lobbies, where it was believed that a proclamation of am-nesty might be executed at once. Mr. Balfour's statement did not reach the city until the Stock Exchange had closed, but an excited market began on the street, culminating in a scene of disorder and excitement. It was impossible to obtain quotations.
