CARNAL CHRISTIAN

Subject of an Earnest and eloquent Address at Christ Church Mission.

The "Carnal Christian" was the subject of an instructive address by Rev. Arthur Murphy in Christ Church last night. Mr. Murphy based his remarks upon the first four verses of the third chapter of the first book of Corinthians. He described the carnal Christian by referring to certain passages of scripture in which the marks of the carnal mind are clearly set forth. The carnal Christian, he affirmed, exercised no power for good, his lax and inconsistent conduct, was not calculated to help any in the heavenly journey. On the other hand he was doing those whose work was that of destruction and death. We may, and it is an awful thought, be hindering, instead of helping on the work of God and the church. The speaker spoke of those members in the church who caused trouble. He said "there are members in our churches who are just like troublesome babies. They cry because they cannot have their own way in all church matters. They will give up their pews under the slightest provocation, and act like sulky children. They would never dare to act in business as they act in church. How do we account for their weak, childish conduct? They are carnal; they are babes." Mr. Murphy then spoke of the character and influence of the spiritually minded man. He referred to the fruits of the spirit and said that every true and consecrated Christian was bearing these precious fruits. "If we are to become fruit-bearing Christians, then the old nature, which can no more be reformed than hell itself, must be kept in the place of death. We must be buried with Christ. We must never take our eyes off Christ if we would have complete victory over the old nature."

He has had two very successful years on the farm. Since last May he has netted in hogs, cattle, etc., \$1,200 and about the same the year before. He has now in his barnyard 30 head of cattle, some of them very fine steers, and seven head of horses, as fine as you will find on any farm in Raleigh. He prides himself on his horses.
