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DIAMOND KING PASSES.

Alfred Beit Made Fortune in the Kim berley Fields and Joined Interests

With Cecil Rhodes. Alfred Beit, controller of the price and output of the world's dlamond industry, who recently died in London, was credited with being the wealthlest man in England and, was said to have been worth probably \$50,000,000, which wast fortune he made largely in South

Africa.

Born in Hamburg in 1852, Alfred

Born in Parents were of moderate Born in Hamburg in 1852, Alfred Beit, whose parents were of moderate means, was educated in Germany. After completing his education he obtained employment in a banking house. Attracted by diamond discoveries and also feeling the need of living in a drier climate on account of weak lungs, he went to South Africa when he was about twenty-three years old.

General Gentaro Kodama, the strate gist of the Japanese army, and chief of staff of Marshal Oyama in the field of staff of Marshal Oyama in the actual during the war with Russia, whose death has been reported by cable from death has been reported by cable from 10kio, was a mite of a man, scarcely four feet ten inches, but recognized as the chief Japanese officer in ability.

He was the man behind the Marshal who ranked the generals who directed the officers who led the men who won the victories from the Yalu to Mukden.

He was never out of Japan's empire, and what he learned of Western military methods he learned from the French and the Germans who were Japan's instructors, or the English, who were her naval instructors. Napoleon's celebrated book of maxims was always in his pocket.

His worth and skill lay in the absolute literalness with which he committed his lessons to heart, and then, with Japanese thoroughness and an eye single to what was to be achieved, laid out his campaign.

away, and the population starved or was deported.
