BARON DE ROTHSCHILD

LIFE SKETCH DOMINATING SPIRIT
IN NOTED FAMILY.

Mastered Finance and Became Fam-
ous in World Finance—His State-
ment of the Law of Money—Mag-
nate Widely Known As Philanthro-
pist and Collector of Art Treasures
—Rise of Great Bankers.

Baron Alphonse de Rothschild, who
passed away at Paris on May 25, was
the second son of Baron James de
Rothschild, and was born Feb. 1, 1827.
After receiving a liberal education he
was inducted into the mysteries of
banking, and almost at once disclosed
his business abilities. While still a
young man he developed a rare taste
in matters of art, and his collection of
art treasures is believed to be unsur-
passed. He always had been a princely
entertainer. The leading artists,
writers and savants of Europe found
a welcome in his mansion in the Rue
Florentin, at the corner of the Place
de la Concorde.

This house was once the residence
of the famous Prince Talleyrand, and
for a time sheltered Alexander I., Em-
peror of Russia. In this Parisian pal-
ace Baron Alphonse during the last
thirty years entertained almost every
royal personage that visited the French
capital. The Prince of Wales, now
King Edward of England, and the
King of Greece have been numbered
among his guests, and so have been
the present Italian monarch and all
the Orleanist princes.

This entertainment of royalties is
hardly to be wondered at, for Baron
Alphonse was the dominating spirit of the
powerful Rothschild family in their
monetary relations with all the
Governments of Europe. In this, of
course, is included the financing of
the colossal indemnity which France
paid to Germany after the war of 1871.
The house has double interests in
Italy, with the Vatican and with the
Quirinal, and it practically holds in its
hands the financial interests of Spain.
The same is true with regard to Aus-
tria. The house also has had extensive

dealings in the securities of American
mines and railways.

In his charities the Baron was munifi-
cent. He has given millions to the
poor of Paris. Within two weeks a
hospital that he donated has been
opened, and last summer, with his two
brothers, he gave 10,000,000 francs to
build homes for workmen, the income
from the dwellings to be used for
social improvements.

But even these philanthropic opera-
tions did not protect him from attack.
In 1895 an attempt was made upon his
life, prompted, as charged, by the
Socialists of Paris. A letter was sent
to Baron Alphonse containing some
explosive substance. The Baron at the
time was away, and a clerk opened
the message. The detonation hurled the
man to the ground, but otherwise he
was unhurt. Two years previously the
Baron met with an accident in the
hunting field, through which he lost
an eye, and the mishap greatly embittered
his life.

The Baron's law as to finance was
thus expressed a few years ago:
"It is the money that circulates
which fructifies; and money circulates
with the same risk to all. Frighten
and threaten capital and it vanishes: Cap-
ital is like water. Grasp it violently and
it slips through your fingers; treat it
gently, dig a canal in which to lead it,
and it flows where you will. Capital
is a country's fortune. It represents
the energy, intelligence, thrift and
labor of the people. Capital is labor.
Apart from unhappy exceptions, which
seem to be unavoidable, each share
in the people's capital according to his
intelligence, energy and the work ac-
complished."

That he held radical views as to
toilers' rights is shown in the follow-
ing expression from him: "It is unjust
to compare a man with capital and in-
telligence, organizing facilities, inven-
tion and knowledge with any gross,
brutal workman, who applies to his
work the unintelligent labor of his
hands."

Baron Alphonse, owing to his age,
was considered to be the head of the
whole Rothschild family. He was a
member of the Academy of Fine Arts
and a commander of the Legion of
Honor.

The story of the rise of the Roths-
childs is as remarkable as any in fic-
tion. The first of the family to become
a banker was Mayer Anselm, who was
born in Frankfurt in 1743. It was the
purpose of the lad's father to train
him to become a rabbi, but the lad
had other views, and instead of study-
ing the Talmud secretly conned an
arithmetic. He was permitted to enter
the banking house of Oppenheim at
Hanover, but later returned to Frank-
furt and opened an establishment of
his own. When he was thirty, in 1812,
after having amassed a fortune, he
summoned his five sons to his bedside
and impressed upon them to be faith-
ful to the Mosaic laws, to remain un-
ited to the end and to undertake
nothing without having first consulted
their mother. Anselm's last words
were: "Observe these rules and you
soon will be rich among the richest,
and the world will belong to you."

With the purpose of keeping their
money in the family, the Rothschilds
have followed a policy of interna-
tionalism. Baron Alphonse, who was a

grandson of Mayer Anselm, married a
cousin. The instances in which the
Rothschilds have married outside the
family are comparatively few, one of
the notable cases being that of Han-
nah, daughter of Baron Mayer, who in
1878 was married to the Earl of Rose-
bery. She died in 1890.

There are now twenty branches of the
Rothschild family, and the London,
Paris and Vienna houses are all man-
aged by descendants of Mayer Anselm.
Custav, Edmund, Adolph and James
are now the chief members of the Paris
house. Lord Nathaniel de Rothschild
and Baron Alfred and Leopold are as-
sociated at London, while Baron
Frankfort Mayer is the family's lead-
ing representative at Vienna. The
Frankfort and Naples houses have
ceased active operations.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, July 5.—(Special).—The re-
ceipts were 600 cattle, 50 milch cows, 300
sheep and lambs, 150 calves, 500 hogs and
50 stock hogs. The butchers were out
strong, and trade was good, as the prices
of cattle were lower than on Monday, but
there were no really prime cattle on the
market, and 5 1/2c per lb. was the highest
paid for prime beef; sold at 5 1/2c to 5c,
and the common stock at 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c.
There were a number of good milch cows,
but there is very little demand for them,
and milkers bring from \$5 to \$10 less value
than such cows sold for six weeks ago.
Prime range from \$20 to \$30 each; six of
the best calves sold for \$50, the others at
\$25.00 to \$7 each. Sheep sold at 13 1/2c to 14c
per lb. Lambs are scarce and good lots
sell at \$4.50 to \$5 per head. Fat hogs sold
at 6 1/2c to 7 1/2c per lb. Store hogs sold at
\$7 to \$10 each, and young pigs at \$1.50 to
\$2.50 each.
