tainment in the "emergency wards" of our hospitals in the bad old days of the bar, especially on Saturday nights, are fast disappearing.

But there are still a few "alcoholic" accidents.

"We run about five a week," we full about live a week, said the accident ward doctor of the Toronto General Hospital. "Such samples as a drunk falling into the fire, a drunk smashing his head in a door, a drunk cutting his head on the sidewalk."

Now, it is believed that the period of infection is during child-hood, between the age of five and nine. But good health does not permit the disease to flourish.

Then if a young man or woman injures health by an excess, the disease, which has a small hold, begins to flourish. Many young men, by alcoholic excess, have given tuberculosis just that opportunity it needed.

The physicians of the Hospital The physicians of the Hospital for the Insane, Queen Street, say that the effects of prohibition on insanity will not be apparent for a few years either. The mental disease created by alcoholism is "alcoholic paranoia", which takes years to develop. But the agency of liquor in all degrees of insanity has been considerable, not only in the drinking generation but through heredity.


