Hospitals and Asylums Show Remarkable Improvement

Prohibition has had a very remarkable effect on local hospitals and asylums, as well as on prisons, says the Toronto Star Weekly.

Fewer cases of pneumonia from drunken exposure, fewer delirium tremens, fewer "emergency ward" cases from drunken brawls and accidents, less hospital "poor relief", are the notable effects of prohibition in Toronto hospitals.

And the hospital for the insane, 999 Queen west, which has been acting as the city's reception hospital for the past year, reports only one case of "D.T's."

The broken arms, cracked skulls, gashed heads etc., that used to provide most of the entertainment in the "emergency wards" of our hospitals in the bad old days of the bar, especially on Saturday nights, are fast disappearing.

But there are still a few "alcoholic" accidents.

"We run about five a week," said the accident ward doctor of the Toronto General Hospital. "Such samples as a drunk falling into the fire, a drunk smashing his head in a door, a drunk cutting his head on the sidewalk."

The effect of prohibition on the white plague, tuberculosis, is not yet apparent, but as is well known, all doctors predict that it will have a great effect in reducing the dread disease.

The foundation of this belief was put in lay language for us by a doctor.

"Doctors believe," said he, "that more than 80 per cent. of the race have the germ of tuberculosis in some degree in their lungs. This belief is arrived at by the examination of bodies and the discovery of the scars of tuberculosis germs, large or small, on the lung tissues."

Now, it is believed that the period of infection is during childhood, between the age of five and nine. But good health does not permit the disease to flourish.

Then if a young man or woman injures health by an excess, the disease, which has a small hold, begins to flourish. Many young men, by alcoholic excess, have given tuberculosis just that opportunity it needed.

The effect of prohibition on t.b. will not likely be noticeable for a few years.

The physicians of the Hospital for the Insane, Queen Street, say that the effects of prohibition on insanity will not be apparent for a few years either. The mental disease created by alcoholism is "alcoholic paranoia", which takes years to develop. But the agency of liquor in all degrees of insanity has been considerable, not only in the drinking generation but through heredity.

Change in Canning Business

G. W. Parker has sold his harness business at Canning to D. N. Slack & Son, who have taken charge and will continue along the same line and at the same store.

Mr. Parker started the business in 1884 and it is the oldest business in Canning and one of the largest of the kind in the Province, and we wish all success to his successor.

The business will be under the management of Capt. L. W. Slack, who has had several years experience in the Harness and Carriage Business. Mr. Slack spent four years in the army during the war and was 30 months in France. He was severely wounded twice and was awarded the Military Cross. Since returning from overseas he has resided in Windsor where he was president of the G. W. V. A. and the Rifle Association.

The Democratic Candidate

James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, was nominated as candidate for the presidency of the United States in the Democratic National convention at San Francisco, on Tuesday, July 6, after forty-four ballots had been taken.

James Middleton Cox was three times governor of Ohio—an honor enjoyed by only one other Ohioan, Rutherford B. Hayes.

Born on a farm, educated in the public schools, a printer's devil, a school teacher, a newspaper reporter, a private secretary to a congressman, owner, manager and proprietor of two newspapers, member of Congress for three years and three times governor of his state is his record to date.

Governor Cox's career has been much like that of Senator Harding, the Republican candidate for the U. S. Presidency. Senator Harding is also a native of Ohio. Like Cox he began his career in the mechanical department of a newspaper and, like Cox, he still owns a newspaper. The Presidential campaign promises to create great excitement in Ohio.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, of New York, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, was nominated for Vice President by the Democratic Convention. He is a cousin of the late Theodore Roosevelt.

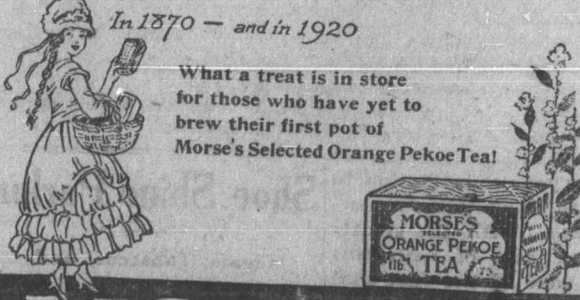
