SPECTACULAR SCENE

Dynamiting of Cliff is Shown in "To the Last Man"

The dynamiting of a cliff which caused thousands of tons of rocks and debris to fall nearly 1000 feet, is one of the most spectacular scenes of "To the Last Man" a Paramount picture coming to the Orpheum theatre next Wednesday and Thursday. Five cameras photographed the explosion from different angles, the cameramen remaning at their posts until the last moment before running for shelter from falling stones.
