JOHN MURRAY'S
BODY FOUND

A week ago to-day it was reported to the police that John Murray, a resident of Fox Harbor, Placentia Bay, had left the fishing boat of Patrick Duke, at Job's wharf shortly before noon. The last seen of the man was when he turned off the wharf into the cove. From information received the police were not inclined to the theory of suicide and believed that the man who was here waiting to get into the hospital for treatment became tired of waiting and decided to go home. It now turns out that the unfortunate man, whose mind was unbalanced, turned back on the pier and ended his life by drowning. Yesterday afternoon it was reported to the police that the body of a man was visible from Job's wharf, between the Western pier, and Geo. Neal's premises. The police were quickly on the scene and securing a boat brought the body to the surface. They found a piece of dory rope securely fastened about the neck of the deceased, attached to the dory rope was a dory anchor weighing about fifty pounds. The body was taken to the morgue and a post mortem held. The body was then handed over to Mr. J. T. Martin, undertaker, for preparation for burial. This morning the remains were sent out by the 8.45 train to Villa Marie station, whence it will be conveyed to the late home of the deceased for burial. The unfortunate man was about 44 years old and leaves a widow and six children, for whom much sympathy is expressed.

LOCAL ITEMS

The fishing schooner Gannet has arrived at Conception Hr. from Labrador with 550 quintals of fish.

The Thetis, Captain Parsons, reported from Battle Harbor yesterday. A North East gale was raging at the time with a big sea running.

At the sale of wrecked goods salvaged from the wrecked steamer Ebbroon at Mudge's, South Side, this morning, hard sold for 21c. per lb. sugar 10.50 per cwt, and milk 5.50 per case.

The following vessels have arrived at Greenspond from Labrador:—The Gladia, 400 qtls.; Stella B. 600; Lady A. P. 500; Elsie D. 300; Diadem, 350; Rosie, 250; Snowbird, 700; Mabel G. 500; Josephine, 500; and A. B. Morine, 500.

Yesterday Mr. A. Samuelson, cooper, Southside, while engaged at work had a narrow escape from being killed. While he was at work outside his cooperage a number of bullets flew by him. He took shelter forthwith, and a little while later some of the windows of his house were pierced by bullets in several places. The police were notified of the occurrence and Detective Sergeant Byrne was sent to investigate. As a result of information received, three lads will be brought before the court for using firearms illegally.

Magistrate Way, of Harbor Breton, has been ordered by the Department of Justice to proceed to Conn River and conduct an inquiry into the tragic death of the three men Bonoff who recently lost their lives in a manner at present unknown. It is thought that the father and the two boys who went up the river on a hunting expedition upset their canoe and all three were drowned; their bodies were washed ashore on the river bank. After several days absence a fourth son decided to go in search of the missing men. The bodies were found at different places along the river bank. The body of the father had been eaten considerable by a dog, which the men had with them on the shooting trip.

The hearing was postponed until Michael Murray, Jr., who accompanied the body home this morning, returns to the city, when his evidence will be taken.

NFLD. BOYS MAKE
COUNTRY KNOWN

Mr. T. T. Cartwright, who has been visiting New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island in the interests of E. W. Gillett & Co., Ltd., Toronto, manufacturers of Magic Baking Powder, Gillett's Lye, &c., was a passenger by the express. Mr. Cartwright is looking well after his six weeks' trip and reports business as extra good. He says the crops in Eastern Canada are very good and that prices will be high. He cites a case in Charlottetown, P.E.I., where a party has an order for 10,000 cases of goods, that are well known in this country and that prices will be 50 per cent. over last year. While in Charlottetown he was told by a prominent exporter that he had received a cable that morning telling him that perhaps Newfoundland would have potatoes to export this year. In Maine, in Arristock County they are letting the school children off to help harvest the potato crop. Asked about the political outlook in Canada: "I don't believe there will be an election, I believe that there will yet be formed a National Government. There seems to be a falling off in munitions manufacturing in Canada, but from what I could learn it is only temporary. The Newfoundland boys have certainly made a name for themselves all over Canada. Everyone is talking of what the boys have done and the number per capita that have volunteered." Mr. Cartwright expects to return to the United States at an early date.
