## EARL OF WEMYSS DIED ON TUESDAY

Retained Youth Till After Passing His Ninetieth Year

London, July 2.—The Earl of Wemyss and March "the father of the House of Lords" died on Tuesday.

Born in 1818 the Earl of Wemyss was until quite recently considered one of the liveliest members of the House of Lords. Long after he reached the age of 90 he played an excellent game of golf. At the age of 82 he contracted a second marriage with Miss Grace Blackburn niece of the late Lord Blackburn although at the time he had a number of great grandchildren. His first wife was a daughter of the Earl of Lichfield whom he married in 1843. He represented East Gloucestershire in the House of Commons from 1841 to 1846 and Haddingtonshire from 1847 to 1883. He was Lord of the Treasury in 1852. The Earl of Wemyss owned about 32,000 acres. His heir is Lord Elcho who in 1911 married Lady Violet Manners daughter of the Duke of Rutland.

## Special Meeting Of Fair Board

Directors Decide to Add Suffolk Punch Class to Prize List

At an informal meeting of the Brandon Summer Fair Board held in the City Hall on Tuesday afternoon under the presidency of J. S. Gibson it was decided to add Suffolk Punch horses to the prize list for the forthcoming summer fair. The prize money and classification to be the same as that for Belgians. The matter was brought forward by Manager Smale who intimated that there were quite a number of owners who desired to exhibit the above breed of horses at the coming fair. As there was no provision in the shape of prizes offered for that class of horse several members of the Board thought it wise to call a special meeting to give the matter consideration. One intending exhibitor would alone exhibit thirteen horses in that class if such was placed on the prize list, and there were quite a number of other prospective exhibitors. It was unanimously agreed that the horses should be included in the list, President Gibson, R. M. Macdonald and others voicing their opinions on this effect.

The secretary intimated that they were going to have an exceptionally large exhibit of cattle, sheep and swine at the forthcoming fair.

It was decided to call a regular meeting of the Board on Friday afternoon.

## "Y SWIMMING POOL"

For the past ten days the boys and girls at the Y.M.C.A. swimming pool have been using swimming wings in their classes for instruction. This method of procedure has been found to be the most beneficial in learning to swim. The beginners can get the proper method of swimming while lying in the proper position in the water as the wings hold one up easily in the floating position. In the last two classes of the boys and girls those who have made the proper progress in swimming have been trying the stroke without the wings. Quite a number have been able to get across the pool and with another day's practice they will be able to get around and take care of themselves. There are only two more sessions left so that it is up to every one who wishes to get down the proper stroke and learn to swim to attend at their respective hour. All the boys who are able to swim the length of the pool on Friday will be arranged in a separate class and on Saturday morning this class will take up a little work on diving.

## "Dusty" Holden Defies Police

WOULD ONLY ALLOW POLICE TO SEARCH PREMISES ON SUFFRANCE

Winnipeg, July 2.—"You cannot enter my premises against my will; you are only here on sufferance and you cannot even remove a man from this building against my wishes. I am well advised and I know what I am talking about."

Man Wasn't there  
Such was the defy of "Dusty" Holden, czar of the Moose club, to chief of police Donald Macpherson, when the latter in pursuance of orders issued at a recent meeting of the police commission, entered the notorious club in pursuit of a man "wanted" by the police. Knowing that the man was not in the club at the time, "Dusty" however, permitted the chief and his men to make a search of the building, but he kept reiterating his defiance of the civic authorities and his intention to resist them if on any occasion they attempted to effect an entrance to his premises by force.

Mayor Steps in  
Mayor Deacon, is loathe to believe that the city police have no right to interfere in any way with these night clubs, about which hundreds of complaints have been received at the city hall. Those who know his worship are predicting that there will be a "show down" between the local and the provincial police on the subject.

His Worship submitted a motion to the police commission which was seconded by Alderman Davidson and carried instructing Chief Macpherson to prosecute any of the night clubs for breaking the liquor license law. No action has yet been taken as a careful study of the liquor license law and of the amendments added to it at the last session of the legislature seems clearly to exclude the city police from the club premises unless they are called in for the express purpose of preserving order or the legal advisors assert.

For Strong Arm Squad  
Mayor Deacon has already advised against paying too much attention to the strict letter of the law. The city police are now keeping a very close watch on the night clubs throughout the city. There is talk of the organization of a "strong arm" squad for raiding purposes but the police refuse to give any information in regard to the matter.

Henley, Eng., July 1.—Canada scored today in the first heat of the Grand Challenge Cup eliminations here when the Winnipeg Rowing Club eight easily defeated the Thames Rowing Club.

Winnipeg's crew won by a length after a hot fight, time 7:05. The Harvard eight beat Leander Boat Club eight after a desperate struggle.

Dibble Wins Heat  
Among the victors in the diamond sculls was Robert Dibble, of the Don Rowing Club, Toronto, the American champion. Dibble was drawn against F. F. V. Scrutton, of the Vikings Club, a strong oarsman. Dibble, however, had the race well in hand from the start, and at the quarter miles he was a length and a half ahead, and steering beautifully, while Scrutton, who has only lately been specializing in sculling, was all over the place. The Canadian was right away at the half mile, reaching the half way mark in 4 mins. 27 sec. Then without expiring himself, he increased his lead, and won by three lengths in nine minutes, 40 seconds.
