MONTHLY MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

Sheriff Foster Will Act as Police
Complaints from Tax-payers
Already.

The first regular monthly meeting of Hartland Town Council was held on Monday evening, March 4th, occupied the chair and the full board was in attendance with the exception of Ald. Carr and Campbell.

The question of employing a town marshal or police was taken up. The mayor reported that he had interviewed E. T. Shaw and J. F. Murdoch and found that either of these husky gentlemen were available for the job. Ald. Cameron reported that Sheriff Foster would undertake to keep the town peaceful evenings for \$1 per night. On motion of Ald. Nevers, seconded by Ald. Hagerman, it was decided to retain the services of Sheriff Foster. The Sheriff's special duties as police officer for Hartland will commence immediately.

Ald. Hagerman reported that he had written Hon. F. B. Carvell in regard to securing quarters for a look-up in the basement of the Dominion Building, but had as yet received no response.

The committee on By-Laws submitted a draft of By-Laws No. 6, relating to impounding of cattle and poultry. There is a suggested fine of \$1 for allowing four footed animals to run at large and 25 cents per head for poultry between the dates of May 1 and Oct. 1. If fowls are impounded it will cost 50 cents per head to release them.

Other by-laws proposed relate to loitering, spitting in public places, and exposure, disturbing meetings, and making noises after being asked to desist. The council appointed as assessors M. Warren White, Henry Teddie and A. G. Baker. It was moved by Ald. Hagerman and Dr. MacIntosh that proper steps be taken toward taking over the assets of the water corporation, subject to the liabilities thereof. Moved by Ald. Cameron and Hagerman that application be made to the provincial government for authority to change the date of the annual election to the second Monday in January. Certain concessions with regard to operating the electric light plant of A. W. Glass were discussed. It was decided to ask Mr. Glass to appear at Council, when in discussing this matter, also the question of street lighting would be brought up.

M. A. Sawyer was heard by the board with regard to the tax on moving pictures. He thought the tax excessive and that he should at least run as many nights as he chose.

H. B. Boyer was heard in protest against the pool-table tax. He contended that \$15 for two tables was as much as his business could stand. The council promised to give consideration in both these cases.

Session adjourned to meet first Monday in March.

In this report last week there was an error in stating the dog tax. Male dogs are to be taxed \$2.

How They Won Honors

The following clipping concerns the son of Conductor Charles Henderson and Lt. W. A. MacDougall, well remembered as commander of the platoon of infantry that was stationed here three years ago. It is the official report of how they won the Military Cross:

Lieutenant Hubert H. Henderson, 26th Bn. (Edmundston).—When the advance was held up by an enemy machine gun nest, this officer placed his Lewis gun section so as to cover his advance, and rushed the post with the remaining sections. During the advance he was severely wounded through the chest, but continued directing his men from a shell hole. His courage under the most trying conditions set a fine example to his men.

Lieutenant William A. MacDougall, M. C., 26th Bn. (Debec).—On the first day of the attack this officer, in command of the support company, led it to its objective. Two days later, when the attack was held up, he filled a gap with his company and supervised the consolidation. When in line he pushed out posts to the left, and on the right led a patrol himself to establish communication. The reports he sent in and his conduct throughout were invaluable to his O. C. (M. C. gazetted December 2, 1918.)

Well Known Houlton Physician Suicides at Edmundston

Dr. Walker, a well known homeopathist of Houlton, suicided in the jail at Edmundston during Tuesday night. During the day a warrant had been issued charging him with the murder of a young girl of Bridgewater, it being alleged that her death resulted from an illegal operation performed by him. He drove over to Woodstock, sold his rig to James W. Gallagher and took the express for Edmundston. Officers at that town were asked to apprehend him and on Wednesday morning he was found dead in his cell.

THORNTON "BROUGHT HOME THE PORK"

Keenly Contested Races Takes Big
Crowd to Waterville

The long talked of horse race has materialized at last and about 400 enthusiasts gathered at Waterville on Tuesday afternoon to see the speedsters pull off their fancy stunts.
