Russians Badly Worsted on Southern Front as Well as Along the Polish Frontier

General Wrangel Has Joined Forces With the Ukrainian Leader, General Makno, During the Operation Capturing the Red Troops Trapped Between Them

[Associated Press by Leased Wire.] Constantinople, Oct. 5.—Forces commanded by General Baron Wrangel, head of the anti-Bolshevik government of southern Russia, have joined the armies led by General Makno, the Ukrainian chief, which have been operating against the Soviet troops in the region of Kharkov. The junction was effected at Siminikova, a village 25 miles southeast of Ekaterinovsk, and the Bolsheviks, who have been trapped in that vicinity, since the anti-Bolshevik forces have been approaching each other during the past fortnight, were captured.
