### LATEST CABLEGRAMS.

#### The Week's News the World Over.

Russia has ordered a hundred more Krupp field guns.

Mr. Pimlott has consented to contest Liverpool for a seat in Parliament.

General Skobeleff is said to have been heavily mortally and to have resumed the advance in the direction of Meru.

The aspect of affairs in India and China has altered the determination of the Government to disband the Royal Marine Artillery for the present.

All the farmers except those in the West country are already excited against the new law which must again this season fall upon them.

The Nile is rising well and accounts of the Egyptian cotton crop are favourable although it is expected the yield will be somewhat smaller than in 1879.

A despatch from Berlin says it is rumored that the Chinese Government is gathering troops for ten thousand men on the Kiangtuhai frontier.

A despatch dated says one of the leaders of the Rumpu rebellion has been shot and several others have received less serious wounds to various terms of imprisonment. The rebellion, however, shows no signs of collapsing, as the British troops cannot stand the usually climate.

In the House of Lords to-day Earl Kimberley announced that Sir Bartle Frere had recalled from the governorship of the Cape of Good Hope. He said there had never existed between the Government and Sir Bartle the harmony which was essential for public interests.

In the House of Commons Tuesday night the Marquis of Hartington announced the recall of Sir Bartle Frere from the governorship of the Cape of Good Hope. Both the Marquis and Earl Kimberley in making the announcement, concluded by saying that the Government took this step with regret, because, while Sir Bartle's views differed from the views of Ministers on important questions, they were not of a high personal character and distinguished services.

AN ENGLISH MISSIONARY MURDERED.

Constantinople advises that an English missionary, by the name of Mr. G. H. B. Smith, was murdered at the residence of his wife on the 2nd inst. by two servants who had been murdered at the same place.

THE LONDON MONEY AND STOCK MARKET.

The Economist says—There is less talk this week of gold going to America. The market is rather quiet, and the price of gold is affected by the report that the Government is now preparing to issue new paper money.

AMERICAN RAILWAYS CONTINUE STRONG.

General Skobeleff telegraphs to St. Petersburg that he started on the 13th inst. on a reconnaissance from Bami against the Turkic Turcomans with a light column, consisting of three companies, three squadrons of Cossacks, three light and two mountain guns, four machine-guns and one rocket battery. He says he has been successful in destroying many guns and many provisions between Bami and Gook-Tepa. After several bloody encounters, he has taken the town of Gook-Tepa, and has established a post d'armee, and Skobeleff is confident of the final capture of the portion of his column to reconnoitre Dost-Mohammed.

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THE NAVAL DEMONSTRATION ABANDONED.

Premature Statements Regarding the Ultimatum.

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ALBANIANS LOOKING OUT FOR STUBBORN ENEMY.

A Vienna despatch says—A rumour has reached here from Scutari that in the event of a naval demonstration a committee of the Albanian League will go direct to Dulegino in order to confer with the commanders of the various fleets on the subject of Albanian aspirations.

PROTECTION OF THE ALBANIAN COAST.

A Constantinople despatch says—A Turkish iron-clad and cruiser have left here for the Albanian coast.

NO NAVAL DEMONSTRATION.

A Berlin despatch says—Diplomats here are now almost certain that a naval demonstration will not take place in Turkish waters.

A Berlin despatch says—On July 25th a Vienna correspondent of some of the London newspapers announced that the Powers were preparing an ultimatum to the Government of the Porte, giving the latter three weeks for the fulfilment of the Montenegrin Convention, the alternative being a joint ultimatum to the Powers.

THE NORTH GERMAN GAZETTE says the alleged ultimatum has not yet been accepted by all the Powers, and therefore the date of its presentation by the Porte cannot be ascertained. It is not even certain that the note will possess the character of an ultimatum, as the Government has not been agreed by all the Powers.

A Constantinople despatch says the identification of the Montenegrin question, has been settled on the Porte.

SPANISH OUTRAGES.

A Call on the Madrid Government for an Explanation—The War Trust has not been known.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—The Herald's Washington special says—The recent outrages upon American vessels in Cuban waters by officers commanding vessels of the Spanish navy is said to have been investigated by our Government for the highest separation a friendly nation could expect, namely, to salute the flag of the offending vessel, and to permit the vessel to proceed on its way.
