Common salt (sodium chloride) plays an important part in the diet of most classes of farm animals. This will be better appreciated if we stop to consider that, of the minerals in the fluids of the body, salt is present in the largest amount. Salt does not contribute directly to the energy of the body as does the food consumed, but nevertheless it is necessary in the proper nutrition of the body. Besides its physiological action salt serves as an appetizer and increases the palatability of many foods. It also stimulates the secretion of digestive juices, promotes good circulation of the fluids of the body and prevents digestive disturbances.

Of the common classes of farm animals, namely horses, cattle, sheep and swine, the latter have the least need of salt. This is in all probability due to the difference in diet, that of swine usually consisting largely of grain whereas other classes consume large quantities of roughage in which less salt is found. Too large quantities of salt derange the stomach and bowels of swine causing gas, diarrhoea, convulsions and paralysis, often resulting in death. Nevertheless pigs should have access to salt, the best means of providing it being to keep before them at all times, in a covered receptacle outdoors, a mixture of salt, char coal, airslaked lime, bone meal and wood ashes or soft coal cinders.

For sheep salt is very necessary. Keeping it before them at all times is here again the most advisable course for an irregular supply induces scouring. The salt tends to keep the sheep in a good state of health and they are better able to ward off attacks of disease or internal parasites. Furthermore, sheep fed plenty of salt shear a better quality and heavier fleece than do those receiving no salt.

In the case of cows owing to their much larger size and the fact that they are giving daily large amounts of milk which contains considerable salt, a heavier ration of salt is needed. For cows being fed in the stable up to 2.5 ounces per day is recommended. While cows giving a heavy flow of milk require an abundance of salt, at the same time the dry, grant cows should not be overlooked as their requirements are even greater. Cattle on pasture usually require less salt than those indoors and the amount necessary varies with the soil and vegetation. On

This account it is advisable to have a supply before them at all times. Either rock salt or ground salt may be used but in either case it should be placed in a receptacle in which it will be sheltered from the rain or much of it will be lost. Young growing animals usually require a larger percentage of salt than do mature animals.

Horses are no exception in the matter of salt requirement. Here again it should be regularly supplied. A cake of rock salt in the corner of the manger where the horse can get it at will is the best means of providing it. Horses at heavy work require more than those that are idle or at light work. An allowance of 2 ounces per day is generally recommended.

**Hardware Prices
Still Mounting**

Important advances have been made on many hardware commodities this week and in many cases this is due to scarcity of raw material. Wrought iron and steel pipe prices have again advanced. Fencing prices are also higher. Other lines having higher prices are: Sash cord, cotton goods, including twine, candle wick, packing rope, etc.; some lines of builders' hardware, furniture handles and knobs, cow ties, ash sifters, safety fuse, blasting powder, tire tape, zinc oilcloth binding, rubber cement, clothes line reels, pipe wrenches, wood chopping bowls, mirrors, electrical goods, padlocks, escutcheon pins, oil stoves and ovens, cant hooks, oil stove wicks, hose nozzles, wrought washers, check absorbers, hose couplings, rubber cement glass-cutting boards, tape lines, measuring sticks, lumber rules and gauges, sulphide piles, and slogs.

The tie-up of freight on U. S. A. railroads is causing considerable inconvenience as many have heavy shipments tied up in transit. Especially is this true of sheets and plates. Very brisk business in all hardware lines is being transacted, despite the cold spell which set in. Spring lines continue to move freely, the business offered being very satisfactory to all in the trade.

Prices on all commodities are firm and the scarcity of supplies has a tendency to cause higher prices. Collections are very satisfactory.

**CANADIAN
MILLING
INDUSTRY**

The Canadian milling industry has, since 1914, made progressive strides and flour exports between that year and 1919 increased nearly five times. Today this business has an annual capacity of slightly more than 35,000,000 barrels a year and new mills are being continually added. In 1919 Canada exported 115,000 barrels of flour valued at \$521,383. By 1910 this had increased to 3,064,128 barrels valued at about \$15,000,000. In the fiscal year of 1919, 9,196,866 barrels were milled at a value of \$39,870,000.

Great Britain has been by far, Canada's best customer for flour, her imports from the Dominion of this commodity, for the last fiscal year, being equal to about 60 per cent. of the total, or \$55,000,000 out of nearly \$100,000,000.

Exports by countries for the last year were as follows:—Great Britain \$56,270,225; United States \$99,794; British South Africa \$17,309; Newfoundland \$34,147,527; British West Indies \$6,329,527; Other countries \$34,147,527.

The Trade returns for the present fiscal year show that, as yet, the exports of flour are holding their own, though the European countries are again engaged in grain growing and milling. In the last available period of five months 4,928,164 barrels of flour were exported, as compared with 4,461,313 in the same period in 1918. Of these 3,912,625 barrels went to the United Kingdom; 38,423 to British Guiana; 146,596 to the British West Indies; 297,845 to France; 100,182 to Greece; 55,735 to Italy; 73,109 to Newfoundland; and 233,984 barrels to other countries. Great Britain took a little more than 1,000,000 more barrels than she did during the same period in 1918, and 1,500,000 more than in 1917. Other governments of the milling industry from large also, as the following figures show:—Canada \$4,032,677; reveals \$4,032,677; Iran, etc., \$1,592,212.

While an account of the change of conditions in Europe, the export trade may fall off considerably, the Canadian milling industry by reason of the activity produced during the war, is in a very strong position and should be able to hold its own in the period of competition which is undoubtedly ahead.

**Uniform Design
For The Graves
Of The Fallen**

London, April 27.—The war graves commission has decided unanimously on absolute uniformity of headstones for the graves of every man and woman who was killed or who died in the war. A plain design in Portland stone has been selected, recording the name, regiment and rank, symbol of religious faith and the inscription which Kipling chose, "Their name liveth for evermore," with room at the foot of the stone for an inscription limited to 66 words, to be personally chosen by those nearest to the dead. This principle of equality, whether for field marshal or camp follower, has the approval of the government.

Kipling and Winston Churchill, with other members of the commission addressed a meeting of the army committee in the house of commons tonight. Kipling, with intensity of feeling, spoke in favor of absolute equality. He said the main object had been to aim at dignity and simplicity and a sense of abidingness. Mr. Churchill said that the whole spirit of the army was in favor of equality and uniformity.
