The Parliamentary Session at Ottawa opened on Monday the 14th inst. The opening ceremonies in the splendid new Parliament Building were exceedingly grand.

In the elections held in South Africa on Tuesday, 8th inst., the Government of Prime Minister General Smuts was sustained with a good majority against General Hertzog, secessionist.

An Ontario woman is suing the town for damage done to her cakes by blasting which shook the house. The cakes made by some cooks would have been in no danger.

London, Ont.—Water supply was augmented to the extent of 500,000 gallons daily by the striking the other day of a deep well estimated by the city engineer to yield at least the above amount.

U. S. now threatens to pass an act so that liquor stored in private cellars may be removed and confiscated. All this, the irreconcilable wets contend, is hard enough for any state to bear, but it's a positive cruelty to Kentucky.

Considerable property damage was done by an earthquake on Friday night in districts centering about the Isthmus of Tehuacan, according to newspaper advices received at Mexico City. It is believed that many lives were lost in the region shaken.

Two hundred cases of Carraway whiskey, valued at \$75,000, and a high-powered launch have been seized near Port Townsend by the coastguard cutter Scout, according to a report received at Seattle Sunday night. The seizure followed the capture of two men, the riddling of a launch with bullets and the confiscation of 130 bottles of whiskey near Port Angeles on Juan de Fuca Straits Saturday.

A lot of crocodile tears are being shed as to whether Germany can bear the burden of the indemnity imposed. German commanders who imposed huge fines on Belgian communities to be paid over-night never gave a moment's thought to their ability to pay.

JOURNALISTS SELECTED
—The Montreal Gazette's Ottawa correspondent, under date of Feb. 9th, says: "Premier Meighen has recognized the press in the selection of the mover and seconder of the reply to the address from the Throne. Those chosen are James McIsaac, King's, P. E. I., and J. A. McKelvey, Yale, B. C., both journalists and actively engaged in their profession. James McIsaac has been a member of the Commons since 1917, and previous to that was for some time a representative in the Prince Edward Island Legislature. J. A. McKelvey was elected in the recent bye-election in Yale to succeed Hon. Martin Burdill, who had retired a few months before.

The funeral of the late Miss Elizabeth Griffith took place on Saturday morning from the home of her nephew, Mr. Charles Mitchell, to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery. Despite the inclement weather many friends and mourners turned out to pay their last respects to one so well known and honored about the city. High Mass of Requiem was sung at the Cathedral by Rev. Maurice McDonald, the Rev. W. Monaghan officiating at the grave. The pall-bearers were John McLaughlin, William Wyatt, P. V. Robin, Thomas Burnett, E. A. Hogan and Thomas Malone. The store of Mr. S. A. McDonald, where deceased had been employed as sales-lady for many years, was closed until after the funeral. Among the many floral tributes and spiritual bouquets was a beautiful floral cross from Mr. McDonald and the employees of the store.

The little girl, who is a daughter of Edward Ware Barrett, a newspaper publisher of Birmingham, Ala., refused to enter a lifeboat until she had brought her parrot from her stateroom, and her insistent demand that the bird be rescued calmed something approaching a panic among the passengers and gave the ship's crew a chance to extinguish the flames and save the steamer.
