### Killed 32 in a Month.

New York Street-Death Toll In-  
cluded Twenty-Eight Children.

New York, June 5.—Twenty-eight  
children were killed and 59 seriously  
injured by vehicle traffic in the  
streets of New York during the month  
of May. The total number of per-  
sons killed on the streets during the  
month of May was 52 and 176 seriously  
injured.

Automobiles caused the death of 15  
and injuries to 112; trolleys killed 10  
and injured 39; wagons caused the  
death of 27 and seriously injured 23.  
One person was run down and seri-  
ously injured by a motor cycle and  
one by a bicycle.

later flames covered the wreck. The  
victim cried for help, but his com-  
panion were unable to aid him, and  
he was incinerated before their eyes.

Milwaukee to Legislate Against the  
Habit.

Milwaukee, June 26.—The Milwau-  
kee Physicians' Association will pre-  
pare a bill to stop the practice of kiss-  
ing and stamping the habit as a "blot"

health and decency."

The action was decided on at a  
meeting last night at which a dozen  
of papers were read on the subject.  
A substitute for the practice offered  
was that of rubbing noses or fore-  
heads, this being held more decent  
by the physicians.

On April 7, William S. Boyd and  
Miss Hallie French of Arma were  
married and next evening a charivari  
party visited them. They had cov-  
erlets, tin pans, shot guns and dynam-  
ite. A hole was shot through the roof,  
trees in the yard were torn up and a  
siding of the house damaged.

The offenders were arrested, fined  
and cuffed, but demanded justice. This  
was refused, when dynamite was ex-  
ploded, the foundation damaged, and the  
yard torn up. Eighteen young men  
were arrested and twelve convicted,  
each being required to pay \$25.00 fine.

### Ball of 100 Years Ago.

Remarkable Spectacle at Royal Al-  
bert Hall.

London, June 7.—The Royal Albert  
Hall was the scene last night and  
early this morning of the greatest  
function of the season, the "ball of a  
hundred years ago." All the notable  
figures of English society were pres-  
ent, and the splendour of the cost-  
umes, and the loveliness of the set-  
ting never had been surpassed in any  
spectacle in London. The ball was  
under the special patronage of the  
King and Queen, and members of all  
the most famous families in England  
appeared in the guise of their ances-  
tors of a century ago.

A series of brilliant quadrilles re-  
presented the court, society, the gov-  
ernment and navy and army, in-  
cludes 1812, the year made memor-  
able by Napoleon's Russian cam-  
paign, the Peninsular war and the  
war between Russia and Turkey. The  
Duchess of Richmond's famous  
dance before the battle of Waterloo  
was danced again. The Countess of  
March appeared as the Duchess of  
Richmond in a dress which was a  
reproduction of that worn by the  
Duchess of Richmond at the famous  
ball. For this quadrille, Sir Charles  
Hartopp represented Napoleon and  
Lord Harding that of Wellington.
