The Tory Slough.

The Tory Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, is now making a great effort to extricate himself and his party from the slough of disapproval into which their career of extravagance and scandal has plunged the picnic party. Daily they are sinking lower in the mire which their recklessness has plunged them. The efforts to carry out their pet projects, the Morris Branch railway extensions and the Morris Agricultural policy have demonstrated clearly to the people their utter incapacity to administer public affairs. The words which Sir Edward Morris applied to a Tory party of other days are peculiarly appropriate to his own party—“Read the last carefully, and I think you will agree with me that, with few exceptions, they are not competent to conduct a bull's eye show.” There never was gathered together such a menagerie, and if Barnum were only alive to buy them out there would be a fortune for them that would put Klondyke in the shade.

This “pack of political apprentices” to utilize another plum from the same pudding induced Sir Edward Morris to break away from the Liberal Party to supply them with “brains.” According to these political seducers, Sir Edward was the “brains” of the Liberal Party, and as they felt the need of mental force, they imagined they would secure it by adopting Sir Edward Morris as leader. They ceased maligning Morris and entered upon a campaign of laudation, turning a summersault equal to their famous change of face after the 1897 election, after going to the country on a platform of No more concessions to Reid. The experience of the last three and a half years has been sufficient to convince the country that the Tory Party is still the stupid party and has not improved by the admission of the new “brains.”

Sir Edward Morris's incapacity to grasp financial problems has become a matter of notoriety and the electorate is disgusted. They cannot forgive him for the way he misled them as to the cost of his branch railway schemes. He apparently has a grasp of neither figures nor words. He conveyed the impression that his 1910 loan would cover the cost of these projects. His followers in parliament iterated and reiterated his estimates, which have been found to be woefully wrong. Even so late as last October in Burnt Bay, he told the same story.

After referring to the five branch lines, and enumerating some twenty places in Placentia Bay and Fortu-Bay, which the Fortune Bay branch would tap, he stated by means of a million dollars he raised in 1910, “We

have been able to build all these branch railway lines.” This is the most glaring perversion of words, facts and figures we have ever seen reported as proceeding from the mouth of a responsible Minister of the Crown. The fact that he has omitted such a report to be circulated widely through his recognized organ is conclusive proof that he was an apt leader of the stupid party in which the blind lead the blind, and land the country into a slough, from which the country can only be extricated by slier minds than theirs. Electors are disappointed and disgusted. They are anxious to retrieve the error of trusting Morris and the Tories. They desired a general election this fall. The Government feared the contest and are holding out for a year longer. But the longer they hold out and the more they struggle in the slough the deeper they will sink, and after next election they will have sunk out of sight into oblivion.

The Vainglorious Fly!

The mind of our courteous contemporary is disturbed at the late store for the vainglorious fly, which is trying to stop the revolution of the chariot's wheel which is running so hard against the Government in Burgeo District and elsewhere. We recognize the respectful character of the appeal, but we cannot allow the feeling against the Government, and we would not let it if we could. The fly is with the fly. The Morris fly is particularly weak in the matter of estimates, whether the estimates relate to finance or to the power of a revolving wheel. Talk of Revolt.

LONDON, To-Day.
Bonar Law has not yet replied publicly to the latest broadside of Churchill who denounced the action of the conservative leader in inciting the Ulsterites to revolt, but there is ample evidence that the unionist leaders are taking up Government, for the diversion of Ulster taxation from Dublin and for the raising of Militia, etc. These plans, it is asserted, will be divulged on “Ulster days” September 28th, when religious services will be held in the chief towns of Ulster province, after which political demonstrations will be held, the participants pledging themselves by solemn covenant to resist Home Rule and support a provisional Government. Between September 10th, and September 27th seven great demonstrations have been arranged to take place in the principal Ulster cities, the speakers including the Duke of Abercorn, the Duke of Devonshire, the Marquis of Londonderry, Marquis of Salisbury, Admiral Beresford, Lord Hugh Cecil, Sir Edward Carson and Frederick Smith.

A Sad Case.

This forenoon a young man named Edward Kelly, about 28 years old, who has lost his mind, was taken to the Lunatic Asylum. Oxen Will Draw

MIKADO'S BODY TO ITS RESTING PLACE.

Services Starts at Early Morning and Continue Until Late at Night—Ceremonial Will Be of Gorgeous Nature—New Emperor and the Dowager Empress Will Read Tributes to the Dead Ruler.

Tokio, August 12.—The official programme for the funeral of the late Emperor Mutsuhito, who died on July 30, was issued to-day. The services are to begin at six o'clock in the morning on September 13, when the Emperor Yoshihito and the Empress Dowager will be present. At seven o'clock in the evening on the same day the elders, the peers, all the high officials and the foreign representatives are to assemble at the palace from which the procession will start at 8 o'clock.

Emperor Yoshihito will not join the procession, but will meet it on the Aoyama parade ground.

The line of the procession which will be very long, is to be interspersed with musicians, torch bearers and officials carrying emblems, while many priests will also participate.

The coffin containing the body of the late Emperor is to be drawn by a team of oxen. The entire route is to be lined by soldiers of the regular army.

Immediately after the arrival of the procession at Aoyama, the funeral service will begin, and will comprise the full and imposing Shinto ritual.

After the service the Emperor will personally read a tribute to the dead monarch, and this will be followed by another one read by the Empress Dowager, who will be succeeded by the Ministers of State and others, the Musicians meanwhile continuing to play funeral airs.

At the conclusion of this service the Imperial train is to leave for Kio, out the Emperor and the Empress Dowager will not travel by it. The train is scheduled to arrive at the station especially built at Momoyama 5.10 p.m. on September 14, and a similar procession to that arranged from the Palace to the Aoyama parade ground will follow.

Various tributes to the late Emperor's memory will be read beside the tomb. Further services are to be held and these will conclude the funeral ceremony.

WALK COVERED WITH WHITE SILK.—The preparations made in Tokio for the funeral are now complete.

The coffin of the late Emperor is to be removed to-morrow from the chamber in which it is now lying to that prepared for the final lying-in-state. The walls of the room have been covered with white silk, and the coffin is to lie in the centre.

Throughout to-night the Empress Dowager and the Court ladies and officials will remain beside the coffin. From to-morrow until September 12 the highest officials and prominent personages will be permitted to visit the chamber.
