AVIATORS BOMBARD METZ.

PARIS, To-day. The following official communication was given out last night. In the region of Neuport there has been artillery fighting. Further south we carried and occupied north of St. George's a farm in front of our lines. In Champagne there has been a bombardment but no infantry attack. In Lorraine to north of Badonville, we have had since Monday. In Alsace at Reims and Ackerkopf, the Germans sprayed out trenches with burning liquid, but without achieving any result. Six of our aviators have been downed and a number of German aviators have been downed. The railway station at Metz. They dropped a dozen bombs which caused panic. DUTCH INDIGNANT AT SINKING OF THE 'MEDEA.'

LONDON, To-day. Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent writes in outline a statement printed today by the Handelsblad, as to the sinking of the Dutch steamer 'Medea' by the Dutch submarine 'Zwaardvisch' on Thursday, of the Dutch steamer 'Medea'. The article says the steamer's orange cargo could not have been considered conditional contraband, and adds the sinking of the 'Medea' is an act of arbitrary violence which cannot be considered a lamentable error. This action, as well as the attacks on Dutch ships from the air can only be explained on the assumption that the many feel certain that so long as no foreign troops or warships attack our country, every act of arbitrary violence against Dutch subjects or property is permissible. We are convinced complete compensation must be demanded from Germany. This last act is certain to arouse great uneasiness and bitterness here.

A BUDGET FROM LONDON.

LONDON, To-day. The comparative tenacity along the whole western front, such as has not prevailed for weeks, leads to the belief in military quarters in London that both armies are awaiting the turn of events in the Carpathians before attempting to strike a hard blow. The British are still reacting on their victory at Neuve Chapelle, and the Germans, though they are reported to be massing troops for fresh offensive, have in the meantime nothing west comparable with their rush last fall. Incredibly it is expressed by some military observers that the fall of Przemyśl will exert an immediate influence on the warfare in the Carpathians, but the optimistic British press are using more despatches relative to the Russian victory in the Usok Pass as a basis to say the Austrian right has been turned, and that the evacuation of Czernowitz is imminent. Germany is declared to be sending vast reinforcements into the Carpathians, and the newspapers

ITALY READY FOR WAR.

ROME, To-day. Every measure possible has been taken by the Italian Government preparatory to the beginning of hostilities by Italy on the side of the Allies.

DARDANELLES FORTS DESTROYED.—TRANSPORTS NEAR SMYRNA.

PARIS, To-day. It has now been established that the forts at the Dardanelles have been destroyed and those at Kilit Bahr seriously damaged by the operations of the Allied fleet in the Dardanelles, says a despatch from Athens, dated Friday. The ships engaged in mine sweeping were fired upon by Turkish field artillery, posted at Erenkeui, but the batteries are said to have been silenced by fire from two battleships. According to a despatch from Mytilene three British and two French warships have anchored in the Gulf of Smyrna with transports.

BULGARIA MAY JOIN IN.

ROME, To-day. Close observers here of the Balkan situation profess to see indications of a gradual tendency on the part of the Bulgarian Government to adopt a policy favorable to the allies. It is believed Bulgaria hopes to act jointly in that direction with Italy and Roumania.

RUSSIAN SUCCESSES AGAINST AUSTRIANS.

GENEVA, To-day. Despatches received by Swiss newspapers continue to emphasize the success of the Russians in the battle which is still in progress in the Carpathians. The struggle in the Tlok and Lupkow Passes on March 23rd is said to have been particularly desperate with heavy losses for the Austrians. Sanginary encounters also reported on the banks of the Biala in Galicia, forty-three miles west southwest of Cracow, where the Austrian attacks are said to have been repulsed with losses placed at 8,000 killed, wounded and missing. The Russians are credited with successes all along the line of the Prutsa (?) in Galicia and Bukovina where they dislodged Austrians from their strongest position.

CASUALTIES IN DESERT SKIRMISH

CAIRO, To-day. An official statement on the military situation in Egypt, reading as follows, was issued here to-day. The British losses in the skirmish in the desert ten miles to the east of Kufri on March 23rd were three men killed, 18 wounded. There were no official casualties on our side. The enemy left on the field about fifty men killed and some 250 rounds of three-inch gun ammunition, but succeeded in carrying away nearly all his wounded. Aeroplane reconnaissance show that this Turkish force has retreated to Nechli.

RUSSIAN STEAM ROLLER CRUSHES AUSTRIANS.

PETROGRAD, To-day. Three million Russian soldiers are rolling like a tidal wave upon the Austro-German forces along the Carpathians from the Durancie River to the Bukovina, thrusting back their foes to their fortified positions in the passes and on the crests.

ZEPPELIN ON WAY TO ENGLAND.

AMSTERDAM, To-day. A despatch from Schiermonnikoog states that a Zeppelin airship was sighted north of that island this morning flying in a westerly direction apparently towards England.

Old paint stains on a carpet can be dissolved with spirits of turpentine.

When chopping figs or dates through the meat chopper add a few drops of lemon juice and the chopper will not become clogged.

When too many sandwiches have been made, open them, take the meat out carefully and use the bread and butter to make brown Betty.

When washing kitchen utensils it is a good plan to use hot soda water. The alkali turns the grease into soap which does its own cleaning.

Chiffon veils can be washed by mixing two parts of finely powdered starch with one part of powdered borax. Spread the veil out and rub the mixture well into it. Shake out and repeat until there is only enough left for one last rub. Spread this on the xtil and let it stand for twenty-four hours. Then shake it out, and the veil will be as fresh as ever.
